Each holder of a War Ration Book One is entitled to five pounds of sugar for home canning, according to award received by the local county rationing board of the office of the Oregon state rationing administrator. It is pointed out that no approval has been granted as yet to increase this allowance, but many requests are being made for sugar for this purpose and forms are now available for the rationing boards to accept applications to issue sugar purchase certificates to that extent for that purpose.

If the application is approved by the board, a sugar purchase certificate for five pounds is issued to each holder of a book.
