

B. P. Club Leads State in Bond Buying

Hillsboro Business and Professional Women's club received the commendation of the state president, Miss Evangeline Philbin of Portland, at the state convention in Roseburg last week-end as being at the top of the list of clubs in the purchase of war bonds and stamps. Out of a total \$107,124.31 for the 29 clubs in the state, Hillsboro had a total of \$18,146.25, the highest of any club. Hillsboro's purchase of \$18,146.25 in bonds purchased by individual members, \$220 bonds by club and \$196.25 in stamps (obtained by members) is a record for Hillsboro, inasmuch as it is only the sixth largest club in the state.

The local club also received honorable mention in another project, "Keep America Sounding," which was the slogan of its member members and which includes about 700 pupils. Toledo club won the prize for the best civic project.

New state officers elected were Miss Helen Swanson of McMinnville, president; Miss Rose Larson of Heppner, vice-president; Dr. Victor Morris, Eugene, second vice-president; Miss Ruth Robinson, Albany, recording secretary; Miss Edna McElroy, Salem, corresponding secretary; and Mrs. Natalie Burns, Toledo, treasurer. Among the state chairmen elected, Mrs. Emma McKinney, who has been editor of the Oregon Business Women since 1936, was re-elected as magazine chairman.
