Schedules Revised By Bus Company

Completely revised bus schedules to comply with the government's request for shorter speeds and elimination of unnecessary or poorly patronized schedules have been put into effect by the Oregon Motor Stages throughout its entire system. It has been necessary to reduce service in some territories, particularly along the Oregon coast, for this reason.

In order that the company may give its fullest compliance to the shorter operation of the service, the public is requested to give its cooperation in every way possible. Passengers are urged to buy tickets at authorized agencies before boarding the bus, or when this is not possible, to have the exact fare ready when purchasing a cash fare ticket from the bus driver, to avoid delays. Many unnecessary stops could be eliminated if passengers would group themselves at some common point along the highway instead of stringing out only a short distance apart.

With the heavy increase in the use of public transportation caused by curtailment in operation of privately-owned cars it is necessary that transportation companies make the best possible use of the allotted schedule time and avoid unnecessary delays in order to maintain schedules on time.
