Water Notice Given
Due to the shortage of water the Hillsboro Public Utilities has passed a resolution to the effect that properties located outside of Hillsboro and located on the south and east side of the street or road shall use the water for sprinkling and irrigation only on calendar days with an even number. Properties on the north and west side of the street or road shall use the water only on calendar days with odd numbers. This will be in effect from May 1 to October 31 each year. Water users failing to comply with the regulations will have their service discontinued until payment of \$2.50 is made to the utilities commission for the restoration of water service.

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Dr. Pemberton Rotary Speaker

"India" and its millions of people and poverty were discussed at the Rotary club luncheon Thursday by Dr. H. F. Pemberton, pastor of the Hillsboro Methodist church. Carl Weber was program chairman. Dr. Pemberton spent some time in India as a missionary.

The monsoon season has broken, according to Dr. Pemberton, who said this brings rainfall all the way from 8.7 to 131 inches in four months with 805 inches as the record in one place.

India is a land of countless villages with a population so compact that the British government estimates the population at 107 persons to the square mile, according to the pastor, who asserted that there are riches on one side and poverty on the other. He estimated that 10,000,000 people go to bed every night without having had a meal during the day.

Everywhere, he said, there is dirt, filth and ignorance. The boys are educated, but the girls are not, and the people for the most part are very illiterate. Dr. Pemberton pointed to the importance of the caste system in India, saying that if a person was born into one class they never rose above it. The caste system, he said, holds India in an iron band.

The country is really preparing to defend itself, Dr. Pemberton said, according to the information reaching him through the church.

Presenters were given to the high school girls who have been serving the luncheons. R. R. Easter made the presentations and Dorine Foelker accepted them for the other girls. Junior high school girls have succeeded them.
