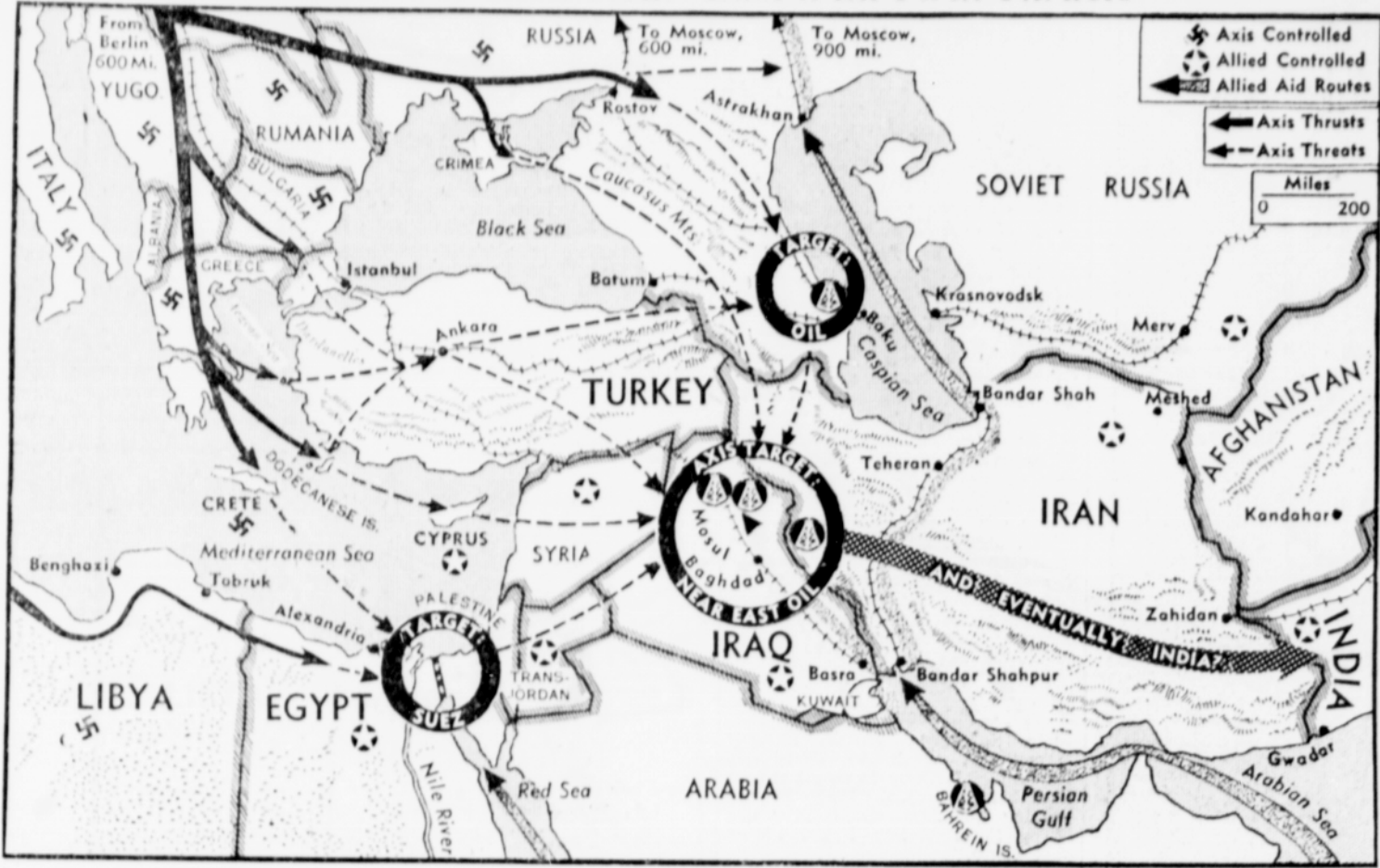

Contest Slated For Members Of Green Guard

SALEM—Camping in the green forests of the high Cascades, with three glorious days spent in hiking, swimming, patrolling and visiting one of Oregon's highest forest lookout points. That is the award offered all boys and girls who place in a fire prevention contest announced this week by the Keep Oregon Green Association.

In all, 29 Oregon youth, 10 boys and 19 girls will be selected by contest judges as winners in the expense paid forest outing. As an additional award some top-placing Green Guard squad will have the opportunity to join the other youth in the vacation awards.

According to the contest rules any Oregon boy or girl has a right to participate in the contest. Only requirement is that the youth be enrolled as a Green Guard either through their own youth organization or by direct contact with the Keep Oregon Green Association, State Forestry Building, Salem. Those not yet enrolled as Green Guards should apply for membership at an early date in order to prove their eligibility.

What each Green Guard must do is this—see that the fire manual is completely filled out so that it has the name of the local forest warden or ranger and so that all fire prevention activities are checked. Then mail the fire manual along with a letter telling of fire prevention activities to State Keep Oregon Green headquarters. All entries must be postmarked not later than midnight September 15.

Complete contest rules will be mailed to all Green Guard captains, youth leaders and county chairmen this week. The outdoor vacation reward which will come just before school begins is offered Green Guard contestants because of their help in fire prevention. B. C. Kuehner, state secretary, Keep Oregon Green, announced. He added that N. S. Rogers, state forester, Lyle F. Watts, regional forester, U. S. Forest Service and John B. Woods, Oregon Forest Fire Association, were cooperating in sponsoring the fire prevention awards.

Approximately \$32,000 in bonds and stamps were sold in connection with the retailers' sales campaign in connection with the national program.

July war bond sales, series E, through county post offices, totaling \$23,722, are as follows: Aloha, \$1,931.25; Banks, \$3,206.25; Cornelius, \$1,800; Garden Home, \$1,106.25; Gaston, \$5,006.25; Hillsboro, \$7,012.50; Sherwood, \$1,031.25; Tigard, \$2,115.75; and Tualatin, \$562.50.

Forest Grove post office reports monthly, but the report had not yet been received by Mrs. Patterson.

Sales through banks, as reported to Mrs. Patterson, during July were: Security bank at Beaverton, \$1 report, \$9,318.75; First National at Forest Grove, \$1 report, \$5,090.25; First National at Hillsboro, to July 27, \$10,806.25; Commercial National at Hillsboro, \$41,531.25; Citizens bank at Sherwood, \$11,321.25; and Tigard bank, \$3,356.25. Total, \$79,950. Two banks do not report. All of these are series E.

Series G bonds sold from July 27 to August 3, 1942, and series F, \$7,751.50. Purchases made through out-of-county issuing agents are credited but the report is made from Washington later, according to the county chairman.

Large Amount of Bonds, Stamps Sold

In co-operation with treasury department request that the nation's retailers stress the sale of war bonds and stamps during July employees of the Hillsboro Penny store exceeded their quota by over 500 per cent and hit \$5,579. Included in the sales were 72 bonds.

Farmers Have Till Aug. 18 For Payment

Washington county farmers who insure their wheat crops through 1945 under the new three-year federal crop insurance contract will have until August 18, 1943, to pay the first installment on the premium. John W. Kanna, chairman of the county AAA committee, announced yesterday.

The premium installment can be paid anytime before that date in wheat or cash equivalent, or it can be deducted from the grower's wheat loan. AAA conservation payment or any indemnity payment received under his crop insurance policy, the chairman explained. This payment plan—the commodity note—was introduced last year and proved very popular with county growers, as it gives the insured grower an opportunity to pay his premium at the lowest market price quoted during the year.

Made More Attractive
The deferred premium payment plan, three-year contract provision, uniform premium rates and a reduced premium plan are all new features that have been combined to make all-risk crop insurance more attractive to county wheat growers, the chairman believes.

Local producers have begun to insure their crops for 1943, 1944 and 1945 by signing the new three-year contracts. Kanna reported. Many of these signing contracts are taking out insurance for the first time, he said. With dollar wheat assured by the loan program, more growers are deciding that they cannot afford to run the risk of crop failure, the chairman believes.
