## 'Wine and Women'

Out of every 1000 men in our armed forces, 11 have syphilis and 40 show gonorrhea, yet when they came into the service, the draft boards eliminated all such. How comes it that in so short a time, with a year or so—our boys have come under a worse scourge than enemy fire? For in the first World war, these two diseases totaled 100,000 more casualties than enemy bullets.

Diseased women—Statistics show that out of every 1000 prostitutes, 500 have gonorrhea and 350 have syphilis. In one house of twenty women, the army check-up gave 18 of them as diseased. Three of these 18 classed under syphilis and their cards totaled 144 as the number of men served in one day. Here we have 144 candidates for ulcers of the bone and flesh, with paralysis and insanity in the offing. These prostitutes are of the motorized brothels. Hundreds of girls are shipped like cattle from camp to camp by the vice syndicates. These facts from Gene Tunney's article in the August number of Reader's Digest.

Once in the service, each man must decide for himself whether he will remain clean or go in for lust. Happy the man who has within himself the dynamic of Jesus Christ who was tempted at every point like as we, yet He sinned not.

Home Training Counts—The first 42 months count for one-half you will ever do for your youngster. These cover the priceless days when he will drink in and build up his life from all about. So you hear Christ in His all-wisdom say—Suffer the little children and forbid them not to come unto Me. Home training counts. Note the families that center the life about the Bible and Christian duty. Yes—They who carry the kiddies to church and Sunday school as babes in arms. Just now we have in mind such a home. Of the two older sons, one is an M. D. with his face set toward medical missions and the other is in Christian work as a life calling. Such homes as this are many in America and have they not turned out a vast deal of leadership for the nation.

Sum It Up—God in Christ and Christ in the heart of the believer. Through Christ, God delivers sinful man from the guilt and power of all iniquity. And there is
