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improve this right-of-way and the men who have conceived it are deserving of credit and support by the people of the state. Nelson S. Rogers remarked when told of the plan of Orville Miller and his associates. "This area is an eye sore for several miles west of the Sunset camp. However, large areas of the Tillamook burn have receded naturally. One survey we took showed as much as 65 per cent of the land reseeded from seeds left by the 1933 fire."

Prevent It Happening Again
"Our big job right now is to see that fires such as destroyed the great virgin forests of Clatsop and Tillamook counties does not happen again," Rogers went on. In 1988 nearly 300,000 acres went up in smoke in the Coast Bay fire which started in September. Again in September, but in 1902, the terribly devastating Columbia river fire, known also as the Yacolt fire, took 39 lives and countless acres of timber.

August and September are the dangerous fire months in north-west forest history. Probably the most devastating of all these late fall blazes was the Idaho fire of 1910 where 85 people lost their lives and one million acres burned. This fire started on August 23, when as one eye witness recalls, "the whole world seemed to burst into spontaneous combustion."

Figures at the office of State Forester Rogers indicate that the fire season to date in Oregon has been the best in history with a record of only 89 man-made fires and a total of only 137 acres burned on protected land. This record alone may be the worst handicap the rest of the fire season in the opinion of Forester Rogers, who feels that citizens who use the forests may become overly confident and unduly complacent because of the late rains and apparent wet condition of the forest pad.

monopolized and engrossed the business of furnishing milk to agencies of the United States, including certain military posts and cantonments located in the state of Washington.

Defendants have required the agencies of the United States to expend an arbitrary and non-competitive price for purchases of fluid milk and have prevented distributors located in Washington from selling and delivering milk to the agencies of the United States.

Defendants have induced the members of the Oregon state milk control board to grant to the association certain concessions which are not available to other producers.

"Unfounded" Says Grelle
While C. E. Grelle, chairman of the Oregon milk control board, declared the federal grand jury charges against the board "unfounded," State Senator Thomas R. Mahoney, long-time foe of the milk control law, asserted that "unquestionably, the next legislature will have before it a bill to repeal the milk control act."

"Any aspirations on the milk control board made by the grand jury are to my mind unfounded," asserted Grelle. "The indictment is couched in such vague generalities and, without knowing specifically what evidence was put before the grand jury, I consider the charges are without basis of fact."

"It does seem regrettable that one branch of the federal government attacks the dairy industry of this area at a time when the war production demand and military requirements are placing a terrific burden upon particularly the producing end of the industry."

Sky Watchers To Be Honored

Volunteer workers who have been watching the skies over Oregon, night and day, ever since December 7, will receive recognition for their faithful service. Monday evening, August 17, when they are presented with Service Pins by representatives of the IV Fighter Command in ceremonies to be held in several towns and cities of Western Oregon.

The Service Pins, sterling silver and enamel medals, are being given to the volunteers in Observation Posts and Filter and Control Centers who have accumulated a total of 300 or more hours of service in the work.

The volunteer observers and filter center workers, who have accumulated the greatest total of hours in Oregon have been invited to attend a special presentation ceremony at San Francisco. The presentation ceremony at San Francisco will be broadcast over the Red Network of the National chain, Monday evening, August 17, from 6 to 6:30 p. m. The program will be the first, incidentally, of a series of 32 weekly broadcasts entitled "Eyes Aloft" and dedicated to the volunteer workers of the Aircraft Warning System.

Medals are also being awarded Monday evening, in Oregon to civilian volunteers who have worked with the system as county and area supervisors of observation posts, chief observers and observers with 500 hours of service.

Big Increase Noted Safe Deposit Boxes

More than 350 safe deposit boxes have been rented at the Commercial National bank here since Pearl Harbor, according to W. C. Christensen, president. Most of these boxes are being used for war bonds, he stated.
