Make a Chalk-Talk

All lost to God for all have sinned and the wages of sin is death. You are dead to God until your sins are blotted out and He imparts His eternal life to you—Ye must be born again, says the Bible.

TWO—Somewhere in the open space above the line, print the word—GOD. Every soul born into this world senses it that there is a Supreme Being. We know that one to be the living and true God. So it stands—"Lost" below the line and "God" above the line.

THREE—Repeat John 3:16 and explain it. For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have eternal life. Make it plain that God loves the lost and gave His Son to redeem them.

FOUR—In the upper section, just inside the line, make a figure of the cross on which Christ was crucified. Two strokes of the chalk will do it. Here flowed the blood that washed away our sins. Here at the cross, we see the sinless Christ become the sinner's friend. Now, somewhere along the line, make an opening. Open the line three or so inches. This is the door, tell them. Here enter the lost who count on Christ's death to save them. From the instant they count on Him, they stand JUSTIFIED. God now sees them just-as-if-they-had-never-sinned. Being now cleansed and made fit for sonship, God breathes His eternal life into their hearts. This is the New Birth. Except a man be born again, he cannot see the Kingdom of God—Bible.

Who of you here looking on do

receive Christ as Saviour and Lord? O. K. Chalk your initials above the line and by that tell the world. Step ahead. Search your Bible to learn your Christian duty and look to Christ and Christ only, for the Power-Strength-Wisdom, to carry on to the glory of God.
