

William Bates, Gaston Veteran, Dies August 5

Funeral services were held Saturday at the Forest Grove Undertaking chapel for William Dudley Bates, 41, who died August 5 at the Veterans' hospital in Portland after an illness since April. Interment was at Cornelius cemetery.

He is survived by his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Matthew T. Bates of Gaston; a sister, Vera E. of Clear Lake, Highlands, Cal.; a brother, Chester M. of Cornelius; a half-brother, John H. of Cornelius; a half-sister, Norma Ellen of Gaston.

Mr. Bates, who was a veteran of the first world war, enlisted in the armed forces when he was 17 and was mustered out November 16, 1918. He was discharged from the service at The Dalles on August 9, 1919.
