

Publisher Says All Can Aid in War by Buying Bonds; Facts Declared Vital

"We must buy war bonds and stamps till it hurts," declared Palmer Hoyt of Portland, publisher of the Oregonian and state war bond campaign chairman, in speaking on "The Challenge of the Crisis," before the Hillsboro Rotary club Thursday. "It is one thing all of us can do."

If anything should happen that war bonds and stamps become worthless nothing else would be of value, the Portland publisher asserted. Hoarding, he said, would bring about the very thing all of us are striving to prevent—the destruction of our government.

War of Many Fronts

On the economic front the nation is spending more than a billion dollars a week for war, with greater spending coming up, the speaker said. We must pay all we can as we go, and purchase of war bonds will accomplish that and act as a safeguard against inflation.

"This is a war of many fronts, extending around the world from Hillsboro, Oregon, to Hillsboro, Oregon, with 11 major theatres of action engaging United States forces, asserted the speaker.

"On the civilian front, our people are willing to sacrifice, even to go barefooted in the streets, once they are convinced it is necessary, but the government has not been realistic in painting the facts about the war," declared Publisher Hoyt.

"It is time that our president came out frankly and told us that we are actually in the Gethsemane which has long been predicted, because if the people really knew how seriously we are threatened in this war for survival they would need no urging to sacrifice."

We are currently losing this war, according to the Portlander, who asserted that we have not yet been able to curb the submarine menace nor have we won a major offensive victory, although our forces have been engaged in many gallant actions. If the United Nations continue to lose battles, this country will have no place to fight in 1943 in this country, he said.

Need for a reawakening of the people, both at the top and the bottom, if the future is to be ours, was pointed out by Mr. Hoyt. "It is your war, what are you going to do about it," he said.

Oregon Men in Service May Vote by Mail

Oregon members of the armed forces, who will be away from home on November 3 election day, may vote by mail in that election.

Earl Snell, secretary of state, said today in issuing instructions for voting by absentee ballot.

In explaining the process of voting by absentee ballot, Snell pointed out the voter must be registered in the precinct in which he maintains his legal residence. So long as the place of legal residence is not changed and the voter votes in at least one county-wide election in the two-year period ending November 30, the registration is valid and need not be renewed.

Here are the steps required for voting by absentee ballot:

1. If the registration is valid, send an ordinary letter to the county clerk of your home county, within 30 days preceding the election, asking for an absentee ballot. This letter should give the voter's precinct number if known, the address to which the ballot should be sent and the applicant's name in full.

2. Upon receipt of the ballot, the voter marks it promptly and returns it in the return envelope provided by the county clerk. The affidavit on the back of the envelope must be subscribed and sworn to before a notary public and the ballot must be mailed so that it reaches the county clerk not less than five days before the election.

3. Soldiers, marines, sailors, coast guardsmen or other members of the armed forces who are registered voters, may register by writing to their home county clerk for a blank and subscribing this blank before a notary, wherever they may be. This is of special importance to those men who may become 21 years of age since entering the service if stationed abroad, the service man may subscribe to the blank before a commissioned officer of the American forces.

Vacancies Cited Military Schools

The First Congressional District of Oregon will have two vacancies in 1943 at the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, and one vacancy at the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, New York.

To determine the eligible candidates residing in the First Oregon District, Congressman Mott has requested the Civil Service commission to hold a preliminary qualifying examination on Saturday, October 3, 1942.

Candidates for admission to the Naval Academy must be not less than seventeen years of age nor more than twenty-one years of age on April 1, 1943. Candidates for the Military Academy are eligible for admission from the day they become twenty-two years of age, on which latter day they are not eligible. Candidates for both academies must never have been married.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that applicants notify Congressman James W. Mott, Salem, Oregon, not later than September 1, 1942, of their desire to participate in the examination.

Mrs. Eva Norgren, 70, To Be Buried Friday

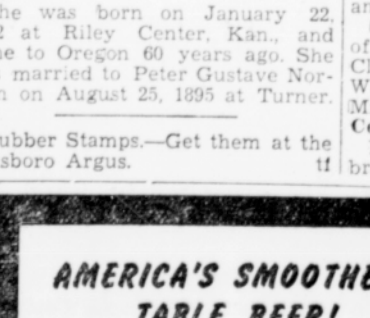
