As a reward for the participation of the children in fire prevention, which is considered so all important to the war effort, school will be dismissed early Friday afternoon, October 9, and the children will be guests of the firemen at a picture show at a local theatre.

Concentrate on Scrap

Firemen will concentrate on their scrap metal campaign during this week. They ask that Hillsboro residents have the scrap placed in the parking by early Thursday morning so that the pick-up of scrap may be facilitated. Proceeds from the scrap donated will be used for civilian defense needs in this community. It is pointed out that no one profits from the sale of scrap metal, that junk men only get a small amount for the work of gathering, sorting and shipping.

Mayor Hugh S. Rogers has issued the following proclamation:

Whereas, the period from October 4 to 10, has been set aside as Fire Prevention Week, and realizing that greater importance than ever is attached to the prevention of fire that might hinder any of our resources during this great emergency and that we owe much praise, commendation and cooperation to our efficient Volunteer Fire Department for their efficient efforts to cut down fire losses and for their outstanding services in civilian defense;

Therefore, I set aside the above dates as Fire Prevention Week, and earnestly request our citizens to co-operate fully with our Fire Boys in fire prevention and in their current drive for scrap metal salvage to assist in the nation's war effort, as well as all other defense activities.

Licenses Lost by Many State Drivers

Nearly a thousand Oregon drivers lost their driver's licenses through suspension or revocation as a result of convictions in Oregon or out-of-state courts during the first eight months of the year.

Earl Snell, secretary of state, disclosed today. The actual number was 977.

Of the total, 861 were revocations and 735 of these were for convictions for driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Revocation of the driver's license is mandatory in such cases.

During the month of August, 119 licenses were revoked and 166 were suspended. One license was cancelled due to misrepresentation of age in the application and another was cancelled due to misrepresentation of facts in the application.
