the safety of children and other pedestrians. City Manager J. W. Barney explained that the highway commission had granted permission for such lights provided the city paid the bill, which runs to several thousand dollars per intersection. The commission, it was explained, did not look with favor on it. Since that time priorities have made it impossible to get such equipment and the question has been dropped for the war's duration. The opinion was expressed that gas rationing would slow the traffic considerably and cut down on the number of machines on the highway. It was agreed that after the war when the traffic situation again becomes serious that collective action should be taken to have the highway department install the lights as it was primarily an expense for them to handle.

Announcement was made of the regional meeting of the League of Oregon Cities here November 10. Committee in charge of arrangements includes Councilmen E. A. Griffith, J. L. Searcy, Verne McKinney and City Manager J. W. Barney.

Approval was given to the purchase of \$5,000 in war savings bonds from money in the sewer sinking fund.

Assessment ordinances were passed on street improvements for South Eighth from Main to Washington, South Seventh from Main to Washington, South Eighth between Oak and Walnut, and on sidewalk improvements on East Cedar between Fifth and Sixth and Sixth and Seventh and on South Eighth from Oak to Cedar.

An ordinance was approved calling for repairing of a number of sidewalks in the residential section.

Beaverton Schools Issue Loss Report

BEAVERTON—The following report has been issued by the Beaverton schools, with a total of 363 present enrollment: In the ninth grade, last year, 129—this year, 147; tenth grade, last year, 128—this year, 147; eleventh grade, last year, 122—this year, 89; twelfth grade, last year, 102—this year, 91; total last year, 481—this year, 435, a loss of 46 in the high school.

In the grade school, there is a gain over last year's enrollment in every grade. The following figures are given, with the first number that of last year's enrollment and the second this year: First grade, 29, 58; second, 29, 42; third, 36, 44; fourth, 38, 45; fifth, 37, 39; sixth, 37, 44; seventh, 38, 46; eighth, 32, 45. Grade School Divided

The grade school first grade has been reduced, with Mrs. Hazel Marshall teaching the new room.

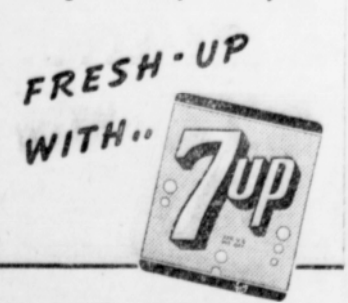
