

Spartans Travel To St. Helens For Tilt Friday

Hilli's Spartan gridders hit the road again this Friday afternoon, traveling to St. Helens for the annual non-league clash with the Liens. The opening kick-off is slated for 1:30 p. m.

Promises of a shakeup in the Hillsboro forward wall this week was hinted by Coach Al Bogue following the Newberg game last Friday. Bogue expressed himself as disappointed in the showing of his line which was outchained during most of the game. Linemen are being given particular attention and the whole squad is being treated to plenty of work.

Last year the Spartans trampled St. Helens 27 to 7 on the local gridiron. The lone Lion score came late in the first half when a St. Helens back got away for an 84-yard touchdown gallop.

In regular TVV league play, loop leaders will tangle with second division teams Friday afternoon when Newberg plays host to Forest Grove and West Linn holds open house for Tigard. The third scheduled tilt is between the two league "cellarites," McMinnville and Beaverton at Beaverton.

Last Friday Newberg, defending champions, knocked Hillsboro out of the three-way tie for loop lead, 20 to 0, while West Linn stayed in the running by handing Beaverton a 14 to 6 licking. Tigard came through with an upset to dump the McMinnville Grizzlies 25 to 6. Forest Grove lost to Tillamook 20 to 0 in a non-league affair.

Make Weekly Reports

Chairman Kovaly has been receiving reports daily from various sections through a self-addressed card system, but from now on the same plan of reporting will be followed on a weekly basis. Cards will be sent out to each community in the hope that reports will be sent in regularly so that credit may be given to the community. This is the only way the committee has of knowing what is happening, according to Kovaly, who said he wanted every community to get credit that is due. These cards should be mailed every Saturday morning, he said.

An appeal has been made through the schools, in cases where they have scrap metal that is too large to handle, to get in touch with their community road foreman, who will give as much help as possible. Chairman Kovaly asks that the collection center be made at the school

or some other central place in the community.

Seventy-five L. W. A. local members and representatives of the Forest Grove Rotary club used two locomotives, each with a gondola and flat car, to collect an estimated 100 tons of scrap metal in their day-long task.

Much more scrap metal still waits collection along logging lines and spurs in the hills back of here, and other rail trips to bring it in are planned, campaign leaders said.

The day's drive was in addition

to two carloads of long rails already shipped to the scrap collection by Consolidated Sunday's harvest consisted mostly of small incidental equipment parts, although the crews loaded one steam engine cylinder casing which weighed about four tons.

One train crew started its loading run from Saddle mountain camp No. 2 while the other began loading at the Vanderjick camp.

Appreciation Expressed

Both the state and county salvage committees want to make special mention of appreciation of the Hillsboro Argus for the fine work done in supporting the salvage drive," declared Kovaly in a statement issued Wednesday. "For without the help of the Argus and the other papers in the county, we would have been fortunate in securing 50 per cent of the present tonnage collected."

Ralph Mitchell, executive secretary of the state committee has issued the following statement relative to old automobile frames:

"In the scrap piles accumulated during the recent newspaper scrap metals drive hundreds of old automobile frames have been gathered. At the present time there is no market for this type of scrap until such time as we are able to get in Oregon, a portable baler made available to our county salvage committees so that these automobile frames may be handled in the manner required by the steel companies when they are buying scrap."

"May we ask that all salvage committees make every possible attempt to save, by placing in some convenient pile or lot, all this automobile scrap, for sooner or later it will be needed by the federal

government in order to win this war and we are urging that this scrap be not dumped into canyons, creeks or rivers where it will require another handling and probably be made more difficult to reclaim when a baler or balers are made available."

Unionists Have Busy Day

Scrap metal for the nation's war effort began rolling into Forest Grove from the hills by the trainload Sunday as a large volunteer crew of C. I. O. union members, using rolling stock donated by the Consolidated Timber company, spent a busy day collecting material along logging company right-of-ways.

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
