

Reds Continue To Push Nazis Back in Russia

Soviet Russia announces that its troops have captured five more key cities in the Don river loop and the Caucasus in smash toward Rostov, the seizure of which would trap the entire German southern army in Russia.

The Russians report that the German army is in full retreat in the Caucasus, blowing up bridges and mining roads in a desperate attempt to delay the onrushing Red forces. British sources estimate that more than half a million of Hitler's finest troops are in headlong flight, drawn before the twin Russian offensives in the Caucasus and Middle Don.

Sink 3 Jap Ships
Heavy bombers of the United Nations forces sank or fired nine Japanese ships at Rabaul in New Britain after an ominous warning that the Japs were assembling a huge armada in the southwest Pacific.

Fifth Army Created
United States 5th army activated in North Africa with Lieutenant-General Mark W. Clark in command in preparation for drive on Tunis and Buerate.

Hill Positions Taken
British infantry, strongly supported by the RAF, captured important hill positions west of Macure Tuesday.

Dr. George Washington Carver
Noted Negro scientist, dies at Tuskegee, Ala.

Bombers Lost
Seven big U. S. bombers missing Sunday after heavy daylight raid on St. Nazaire, Germany's huge submarine base.

Out Japs at Buna Mission
General MacArthur reports Japs ousted from Buna mission area and that the rest of the enemy's situation is hopeless.

Gets 32 Planes
An American battleship, bristling with anti-aircraft guns, destroyed an entire flight of 30 enemy dive bombers in an October sea-air battle in the Pacific. The battleship destroyed a total of 32 Japanese planes before the enemy finally ceased trying to sink it.

Flood Takes Lives
At least ten lives lost and millions of dollars in property damage result from one of worst Willamette river floods in Oregon's history.

Navy Communique
Indicates that Japanese on Monday made their most successful attempt in six weeks to get supplies to their forces on Guadalcanal. Eight enemy destroyers reaching vicinity of island attacked by heavy PT boats.

Congress Opens
Rate Cut Ordered
State Public Utilities Commissioner Bean orders Portland General Electric company to make a substantial and unconditional rate reduction in the Portland area.

Chicago Fire Kills Six
Six persons killed and more than 100 injured in a fire and explosion in Chicago on Monday night.

Airport Value Cited
The outstanding work of the past year has been the building of our municipal airport, and, although the completion as mapped by government has not been fully taken care of, we can be proud of the work as completed. New Victory Tax Anti-inflationary

That the new Victory Tax is an anti-inflationary as well as revenue measure was the declaration of A. L. Amacher, local accountant, in discussing the 1942 Revenue law before the Hillsboro Lions club Wednesday. This is evidenced by the fact that credits are allowed for purchase of government obligations, debt retirement and life insurance premiums paid, all of which reduce the individual purchasing power.

The new Victory Tax will apply to every individual, the withholding portion of the law applying only to wage earners. Amacher stated. Everyone will be required to file a return at the end of the year. If more than enough tax has been withheld during the year, the taxpayer will receive credit for the excess on his federal income tax payment.

Changes in the federal income tax law such as increased rates, reduction of exemptions and new deductions were explained by Amacher. Ed C. Coman was meeting chairman.

Edward Carter Now Second Lieutenant

Second Lieutenant Edward Carter reports for duty at Camp Adair today (Thursday) after visiting since December 27 with his mother, Mrs. Viola Carter, and family. Firdale Lt. Carter was graduated from the field artillery officers' training school at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and received his commission December 24.

This visit home was the first since he entered the regular army in August, 1937, and the "best Christmas" for Mrs. Carter. The young soldier was sent to the Hawaiian islands in December, 1937, and was serving there as a motor sergeant at the time of the Japanese sneak attack December 7, 1941. He admits that he had a peculiar feeling when the Japs bombed a nearby air field and strafed the ground. The rumble of his car was peppered with machine gun bullets. The local soldier said he, along with the others, sat down when they got into action.

The young officer, who won ratings as expert in pistol and as an artillery gunner, served in Battery K, Hillsboro national guard unit, before enlisting in the regulars.

Savers of Gasoline Not to Be Penalized

Holders of supplemental gasoline rationing books—B and C—will not be penalized when new books are issued if they fail to use all they originally estimated would be required for their occupational needs.

Rites Set Today For Milo Harris

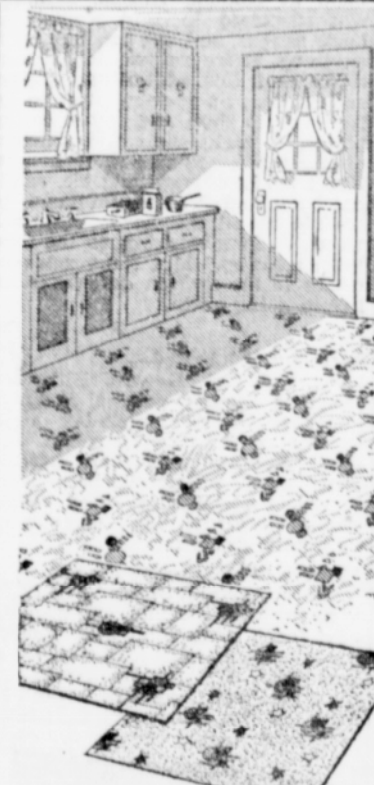
