Miss Beryl Holt Luncheon Speaker At A.A.U.W. Meet

"Training Our Children for the Post War Era" was the theme of an address by Miss Beryl Holt of the Salem educational system, at a luncheon meeting of the Forest Grove-Hillsboro branch of American Association of University Women held in the Peter Boscow school Saturday. Miss Holt, a former state president of A. A. U. W., has devoted her life to raising the educational standards of Oregon, and is well informed as to the needs of children in a changing world. "There are many knowledges and loyalties to aid in the child's social adjustment that should be taught by wise parents and teachers," she said. "Subjects not mentioned in the curriculum, but nevertheless all-important if the child is to take his place in a readjusted society; such as the strength and weakness of our democracy, the way our society works, his part in society, the ideal of achievement, the obligation and opportunity to work, the pursuit of truth and fairness and individual dignity."

Miss Holt's talk was in line with a nation-wide movement by A. A. U. W. groups to establish "education as a first form of defense in a democracy."

Local A. A. U. W. committees are investigating the need for supervision for children of mothers in war industries, and are prepared to formulate plans for assistance of this kind.
