Co-operation Seen Garden Conference

group that for 1943 the secretary of agriculture had asked through the state war board, that in Washington county there be an 83 per cent increase over last year in the number of fresh vegetables grown for market. This matter was considered and the committee felt that this goal could be arrived at provided people were acquainted with the need and possibilities of growing these crops. Crops included in the group were sweet corn, tomatoes, carrots, lettuce, cabbage, and other similar vegetables.

It was suggested that farm families who have the ground and are able to grow good gardens, might grow more than is needed for the family. The additional crop might be sold or used to supply others in the community who did not have suitable soil on which to grow gardens.

Uprooting Discouraged
In regard to the growing of vegetables in city or urban areas, the committee's opinion was that the present situation does not warrant the indiscriminate uprooting of flowers or shrubs nor the wholesale plowing under of lawn areas to make room for vegetable gardens. Such attempts would add but little to the sum total of food production and might lead to needless waste of seeds, fertilizers, sprays, and other materials. Possibly certain ornamental plantings, where the area is weedy, might be devoted to vegetable gardens as a cultural crop so as later to be replanted and improved after the war. However, it was pointed out that low fertility and areas under trees were problems which would meet the urban gardeners. In general, the situation in the opinion of the group, is such that it can be met without the destruction of valuable ornamental plantings.

In discussing storage and preservation of fruits and vegetables, the committee recommended that some folks might use commercial or home-made dryers to help preserve certain fruits and vegetables rather than using critical tin or other materials. The group asked that garden information on this subject be sent out through the mail and in the local papers.

Cooperative and community gardens were discouraged, pointing out that in many cases these had proven to be unsatisfactory.

the army. The late Major General George A. Waite commanded the division until his death, November 23, 1941. His death was believed hastened by illness aggravated by his refusal to leave his troops during strenuous maneuvers.

General MacArthur's commendation revealed that the 41st division was the first time that Oregon and Pacific northwest men, as a considerable unit, had been engaged in action in the second world war.

Division Dates to Last War
The 41st division was organized during the first world war and its members and units saw action in many of the great engagements, but the division was used for replacements for other units and, consequently was denied the distinction of fighting as a unit. Many from this community served with the division in the last war.

Now, inscribed on its record in this war, is its brilliant part in the reduction of the Japanese army of 15,000 men on Papua.

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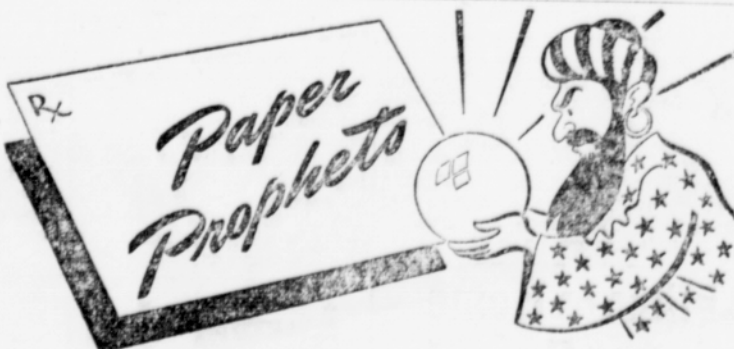
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
