being set for 2 p. m. Monday, when messages were to be delivered by him and Governor Charles A. Sprague. Just before the senate deadlock was broken the senate agreed to a house resolution for the inauguration to be held at 2 p. m. on Wednesday.

The senate and house met in joint session in the hall of representatives to hear the Sprague and Snell messages and for the incoming governor to take his oath of office.

Much to one's surprise, a flock of house bills have been drafted at this early date, and are ready for the legislative hopper. As a rule it takes about ten days or more to get the bills really coming in, but such will not be the case this session. Attorney General Van Winkle sent a letter to each legislator stating that his office was prepared to assist in drafting bills on any matter they might have in mind. Hence, the lawmakers immediately got busy, and the house will see a deluge of bills pronto.

The battle royal over the senate presidency is bound to bring forth a bill which would create the office of Lieutenant Governor. If such a measure is passed by the house and senate it will be submitted to the people at the next regular election. Horse trading in its heyday had nothing on the way trades are made for senate presidency votes in behalf of some faction's favorite. If the office of Lieutenant Governor were created by the people all of this waste of valuable time in electing a Senate President would be done away with, as the Lieutenant Governor would always be a deep political wound inflicted by one side or the other; wounds which will not heal all during the session, and bitter feelings are always carried by the losing side regardless of who is loser. All of this nonsense would be stopped once and for all if the people would create such an office, which almost every other state in the union has done.

There is not nearly the usual array of camp followers and job seekers around the state house this session. Believe it or not, stenographers are in demand. For once the lawmakers of both houses don't have to duck out the side doors in order to get away from the pie counter boys and girls, which has always been the case heretofore. Incidentally, we suppose it is to be expected, the city of Salem is going to town in a big way. Living quarters are as scarce as hen's teeth, and prices, Oh, me. However, the weather has been beautiful all week.

Almost half of the lawmakers are freshmen. One of the pre-session surprises was the appointment of Jack Lynch of Portland by the county commissioners to the senate seat of Chester McCarty who is serving in the army. Lynch has been an active lobbyist for years, representing the druggists' association, and many of the old timers arched a surprised eyebrow when his appointment was announced.

Draft Delinquents Sought by Boards

consisted chiefly of forgetting to report a change of address to local boards. Only by immediately contacting local boards can registrants suspected of delinquency hope to clear themselves, he pointed out.

Notices of delinquency have been sent to 3,467 Oregon registrants since the beginning of Selective Service operations, but 135 of this number cleared themselves with local boards without being reported to the United States District Attorney. The balance includes 752 registrants listed as delinquent but not yet reported to the United States District Attorney and 1,200 who were reported to that official. Of the 1,200 reported to the United States District Attorney, 709 were cases are pending.

Crack Down Soon
Beginning February 1, 1943, delinquent registrants can expect law enforcement officers to "crack down" on them, as indicated by Colonel Wootton. "In time of war, when intentional shirking of a prime duty of citizenship is reprehensible, and a deliberate attempt to evade service for the nation cannot be condoned," Colonel Wootton declared.

It was also intimated that registrants could expect increased activity upon the part of law enforcement officers to investigate persons between 18 and 65 who failed to carry registration certificates. Persons 18 to 45 must not only carry with them the registration certificate but also a notice of classification if they have been registered for six months or more.

In connection with the new requirement that a registrant have notice of classification in his possession, Colonel Wootton urged registrants between 18 and 45 to obtain

B. W. Barnes Dies Here on Monday

long-time service record for which there is believed to be no equal in the state. A native of Ohio, he came to Hillsboro in 1900 from Nebraska, where he was graduated from the Teachers' College at Lincoln, Neb., and was one of the city's eight elementary teachers in that capacity until 1926. He was elected and served a four-year term as county school superintendent. Following this service he was named superintendent of Hillsboro schools and became the first union high school superintendent in 1926. He held that office continuously until the end of the 1939 school year.

Honored by Community
Hundreds of former students and old friends gathered at the high school on a Sunday in May of 1939 to pay tribute to the veteran educator. The program was climaxed by presentation of a console model radio as a gift from "alumni and friends in appreciation of his services in the educational systems of Hillsboro and vicinity," according to a story in the Argus of May 11, 1939.

The Argus story pointed out that "in presenting Mr. Barnes with the radio, Zenos Olsen, a member of the first Hills graduating class and a former Hills principal, said that although each class feels that B. W. Barnes belongs to that class, the fact is that he belongs to all of us."

R. R. Easter, chairman of the grade school board, declared the program would not be complete without dedicating the present school administration to a continuation of the noble work carried on for 39 years by Mr. Barnes.

School Named for Him
"The junior high school, variously referred to by that name and by the name B. W. Barnes school, will hereafter be known by only the latter name, Mr. Easter said, so that the name shall not perish in the years to come."

The educator was a member of Tuahly lodge, A. F. & A. M. for 37 years and a member of the local Congregational church since coming to Hillsboro. He served as Sunday school superintendent for 21 years and was a member of the board of trustees of the church off and on throughout his residence here, and was re-elected Sunday night in that position.
