London School Bombed



LONDON—Although incapable of breaking through London's anti-aircraft defenses to strike at any vital war objective, Nazi airmen were still able to unload their cargoes of death on defenseless schools and kill many children. In the most recent retaliatory raid it left this school in ruins. Rescue workers are looking for bodies. This is the first time London has been bombed in many months.

Attorney's Tax Policy Announced

Income taxpayers are advised in a resolution passed by the Washington County Bar association to take advantage of the offer of assistance from state and federal income tax auditors scheduled to be in the county at different places during February and March, according to a letter sent to county papers this week by District Attorney G. Russell Morgan.

M. W. Johnson Dies Tuesday; Funeral Friday

Manellus William Johnson, 88, died at his home in this city Tuesday afternoon, and funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the Methodist church, Rev. H. F. Pemberton officiating. Interment will be at Lincoln Memorial park in Portland.

Mr. Johnson was born May 9, 1854, at Johnson's Cross Roads, Monroe county, Virginia. He was married to Mattie Allison of Louisiana, Missouri, March 18, 1880. He came west with his family in the early nineties and had lived in Washington, Idaho and Oregon, coming to Hillsboro in 1927.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at their home here on March 18, 1930, and their sixtieth anniversary in 1940.

He is survived by his wife, Mattie, and daughter, Mrs. E. Fayette Allen, both of Hillsboro; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. C. E. Johnson of Salem; two sisters and three brothers in West Virginia; one brother in Florida; and one brother in Sacramento, Cal.; also 13 nieces and nephews.

Mr. Johnson had been a merchant and farmer, but had retired when he came to Hillsboro. He was a member of the Methodist church of Hillsboro, Woodman of the World, and Donald lodge, A. F. and A. M.

Greater Care by Pedestrian Urged

With 44 per cent of the pedestrian fatalities in Oregon during the first three months of 1942 resulting from accidents in rural areas, the state traffic safety division today urged Oregon citizens to help cut this death toll by walking more carefully when on rural highways.

Of the 59 pedestrians killed in traffic accidents during the first eleven months of the year, 26 were killed as a result of accidents in rural areas. Of these 26, 21 occurred in accidents in the Willamette valley area.

Unsafe pedestrian practices such as walking on the right side of the road, with traffic, instead of on the left side, facing oncoming traffic, crossing highways when cars are approaching, walking on the highway at night without showing a light or without wearing something white, are the chief factors contributing to the rural pedestrian toll, according to the safety division.

This winter, children in many areas must walk to school during the hours of darkness in the morning and parents are urged to equip them with flashlights, or see that one member of a group carries a flashlight, or that several of the children wear white raincoats or other light colored clothing. In one area of Portland, junior safety patrolmen are to be equipped with red lanterns in place of the usual safety flag as a measure of safety by giving motorists advance warning of the presence of children.

Army Seeks Dogs For War Effort

The United States army has recently officially recognized the dog as necessary to the war effort and has made the dog a part of the army. Dogs now are being trained for various army duties which include sentry duty, combat duty in guerrilla warfare, messenger work, ambulance and first aid work, carrying packs, for cart and sled hauling and for reconnaissance duties, among others.

The Remount Service, a branch of the Quartermaster Corps, has been charged with receiving, training and issuing the dogs. Dogs for Defense, Inc., a national civilian organization, has volunteered to act as a procurement agency for obtaining dogs for army needs. Dogs for Defense, Inc., a national, non-profit organization whose personnel donate their services, is officially recognized as the sole procurement agency for war dogs. It selects from dogs which have been offered, free of charge by their owners, the individuals that meet army requirements and later arranges to transfer them to the nearest army dog training center, of which there are at present four, located at Front Royal, Va.; Fort Robinson, Neb.; Camp Rimini, Helena, Mont.; and San Carlos, Cal.

Limit on War Bonds Raised For Individual

H. L. MacKenzie, war bond chairman of Washington county, said today the amount of Series E war bonds which can be purchased by an individual has been raised from \$5,000 to \$10,000 in co-ownership with another individual.

This does not necessarily mark the limit according to MacKenzie. He pointed out that war bonds to the amount of \$5,000 can be purchased with still additional co-owners so long as such bonds are apportioned to the third party.

"By this arrangement a family of four can buy war bonds to the extent of \$20,000," Mr. MacKenzie stated, \$10,000 can be held between husband and wife, \$5,000 between father and first child, and \$5,000 between mother and second child.

There is no limit to which this arrangement can be carried out between relatives and friends, according to the county chairman.

"The government puts up no barrier against an individual who appears as co-owner with several others," the chairman stated. "The holdings of each person is computed separately. Acting as a co-owner does not affect his status so long as the amount of bonds concerned are apportioned to the maximum of \$5,000 to each individual."

Outdoor Men Sought for Army Mountain Training
OREGON STATE COLLEGE—An opportunity for men to join the United States army mountain service is now open to all who prefer such outdoor service and have the physical fitness needed according to a request received here for acquainting all men students with this possibility.

Men already enrolled in the enlisted reserve corps or those who expect to be inducted through selective service may make application to join the mountain forces and, if accepted, will be sent there upon induction. A national effort is being made now to increase the mountain forces being trained in their own camp at Camp Hale, Colorado.

Applicants need not be skiers or even mountaineers, but qualifications do include exceptional stamina and ability to live and take care of oneself in the open. Full particulars and application blanks may be obtained from Fred H. McNeil, vice-president of the National Ski association, Journal building, Portland.
