S. Sgt. James Abts Now in Officers' Candidate School

In a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Abts, Staff Sergeant James Abts says, in part: "I've been transferred to officers' candidate school and my address has been changed. I told you about applying for it, but didn't think they would establish a school over here, but they did, so consequently I have been transferred miles away from my old outfit. I'm going to miss my friends, Frank, Ned, and all of them. (The friends referred to are Frank Ryan and Ned Ross). Changes are that I won't see them until the war is over, now. This is the same set-up Dick has except that I am going to artillery school. This has been a dream of mine for so long that I'm going to work as hard as I can and try to complete the course.

"And by the way, will one of you notify the Argus of my change of address so that I'll continue to receive it? That's one of my few contacts any more.

"Of course, I can't tell you where I am, but it is new to me, so will enjoy being here for awhile at least. There are a lot of really swell men here, Joe Fowler is here going to infantry school."

Excerpts from a letter written previously (on Christmas Day) tells of his Christmas. "Last night we had a midnight mass which I'll not forget for a long time to come. It was held outside, of course, and the moon was in the trees behind the altar and the sky was a very deep blue. Ned, Frank and I all went to communion together. It was the first time we've been together for something of other Christmases and of course those to come.

Today the battery had a very special Christmas dinner which was held at the Hillsboro Pharmacy. Mrs. E. W. Alquist, Mrs. A. M. Abrams and Mrs. Lu Verne Abendroth. Hostesses for the next regular meeting of the group will be Mrs. Edward C. Doman, Mrs. Bowman and Mrs. Merwin W. Brink.

So it hasn't been such a bad Christmas considering the circumstances. A lot of the boys probably didn't get to eat today, and they are the ones we must consider. I certainly have been brought home with quite a force. I'm thinking of the Australians and the British who have been in this war for so long. This makes only one year for us, but they've been watching their boys go for three. I wish many Americans could see. And it hasn't been easy for them. I believe we should think of them as well as our own boys. I realize now, more than ever, that this is going to be a long war and that we haven't gotten to the tough part yet."

DeFrees in New Mexico

A C Norman DeFrees in a letter to his parents said that he was at Roswell, New Mexico, in the largest air training school in the United States, and will finish in a couple of months. He tells of the first treatment accorded to the service men by the citizens of that community. He was quite surprised to see Jerry Peschka there as his commanding officer—now Captain Peschka.

Sewells Receive Letter from Turkey

A Christmas card and letter received by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Sewell and the other Sewells from their cousin, Miss Dollie Hinman, who is a teacher in Izmir, Turkey, tells of conditions in that country. Miss Hinman formerly resided in Forest Grove.

She says, in part, "All is going well with me; school full and going on quietly and serenely; weather has been perfect, though today is a bit nippy but sunny. We have a good tennis court, so friends like to come and play."

"All prices are sky high now, butter and sugar especially, so we make our cakes with pekmez, a grape syrup something like molasses. As for dress goods, we are all thankful we have old clothes to wear. You may imagine we do not do much buying when goods sell for \$18.85 per yard.

However, we are perfectly comfortable and have plenty of good wholesome food—just cut out luxuries is all, but I guess you are doing something of that sort at home.

I may come home next summer to stay. All depends on travel conditions. One can get there easily enough by airplane if one wants to pay the price—something like \$1,000 out of one's pocket, for the board pays only what it would cost by boat.

"Turkeys are just about worth their weight in gold here. However, we had some for dinner. All the Americans in town (22 in all) had a nice dinner. They raise sweet potatoes here almost as big as a pumpkin, nice and sweet. As a rule potatoes here are not as nice as Willamette potatoes."

Proper Cooking Meat Suggested

When the supply of meat is limited it is doubly important that homemakers cook the meat properly so as to get the most from every pound. As a result of years of research in meat cookery certain basic principles have been developed which apply to all methods of preparation.

In general, the tender cuts of meat are cooked by dry heat—that is, they are cooked in an uncovered pan with no water added. Veal and pork chops and steaks are exceptions because they are always cooked by moist heat.

The less tender cuts are cooked by moist heat—by braising—that is, the meat is in a heavy kettle then add a tight-fitting lid and add a small amount of liquid if necessary. Pork chops should be braised without added liquid.

Another moist heat method—cooking in water—is used for soups and stews. Cover the meat with water, cover kettle closely and cook at simmering temperature until tender.

Cook all meats at a moderate temperature in order to retain flavor and food values and to prevent excessive shrinkage. Avoid overcooking for the same reasons.

Camp Fire Workers Hold Training Meet

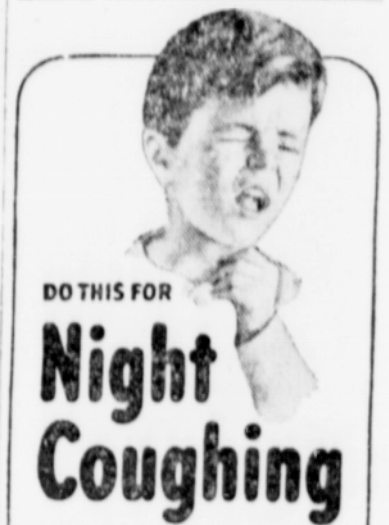
