Marines Battle Japs As Photograph Plays

YONKERS, N. Y.—U. S. Marines at Guadalcanal have put a new wrinkle in their version of a modern battle, according to word received here. The Leathernecks, during a recent clash with the Japanese, amused themselves by playing a phonograph.

Marine Gunner William T. Smith of Brooklyn, stationed at Guadalcanal, informed a friend here by letter that the music was played to the accompaniment of rifle and shell fire.

"When our guns were roaring, shells and bullets whizzed over us," wrote Marine Gunner Smith. "The phonograph, equipped with an amplifier, was playing 'Why Don't We Do This More Often,' 'The Little Man Who Wasn't There,' and a half-dozen other tunes."

"Our colonel got a big kick out of the music going on during the battle, and said 'how in the devil can anyone like an outfit like us!'"

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Relative Killed In Action; One Prisoner of Japs

One son killed in action, one daughter a prisoner of the Japs, one son twice torpedoed on merchant ships, and one daughter now in Alaska not far from Jap strongholds. This is the experience of Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Evans of Portland.

The Evans family is well known here. Mrs. Evans being the former Miss Anna Muecham of near Mountlake, and a sister of Mrs. Fred Evans of Hillsboro and the Muecham brothers of the Mountlake-Banks section.

The oldest son was Lt. Commander E. E. Evans, recently reported killed in the South Pacific. He enlisted in the Oregon cavalry in May, 1917, a unit which later became the 148th field artillery of the 66th field artillery brigade, which made a name for itself in France, under command of the late Colonel George A. White, later major-general of the 41st division of the Pacific northwest troops.

After the war, Evans graduated from the University of Oregon medical school about 1929 and saw continuous service with American outposts until 1940, when he served in the Portland recruiting station of the navy for several months.

The oldest daughter, Lieutenant Bertha Evans, was one of the five army nurses who returned to Manila from Corregidor when Manila was falling into Japanese hands and attended the wounded who were left behind. She is now a Japanese prisoner. The younger son, a second officer in the merchant marine, has twice been on ships that have been torpedoed and sunk, but is again at sea on convoy duty. The second daughter is in Alaska, where her husband is a government employee.

Oregon in Second Place in Red Cross First Aiders

Second only to Nevada in the number of Red Cross first aiders trained since October, 1939, the state of Oregon today took a bow in a year-end report of A. L. Schafer, Pacific Area manager of the American Red Cross.

"Eighty-four in every thousand citizens of Oregon," Schafer said, "carry certificates showing them to be trained graduates of the Red Cross standard, advanced or instructors first aid course. This is far above the national average of 24 persons and the Pacific Area average of 63 persons trained in the same period."

The seven states and Alaska, forming the Red Cross Pacific Area, stand on a basis of first aiders per thousand population, as follows: Nevada 90, Oregon 84, Washington 72, California 61, Arizona 59, Idaho 48 and Utah 42. Alaska ties the national average with 34.

The Red Cross goal is to have all persons engaged in industry or in farming trained, and to have a first aider in every home in America.

"The five and one-half million new first aiders trained during 1942 are one tremendous contribution of the American Red Cross to America's war effort," Schafer said. "Industrial leaders and workers alike know that first aid training not only is important in case of accident, but it actually pre-
