Mr. Mitchell assisted by his wife, still does all the barn work on their farm where they now have a herd of 2 milk cows, 19 of them milking three times a day. Three milking machines solve this problem. Despite the shortage and the increasing demands for increased production caused by the war, Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell are working toward a 40-cow herd, which they feel they can still care for without additional help. Last year Mr. Mitchell's 12-cow herd topped the state with a Dairy Herd Improvement association production record of 14,877.8 pounds of milk and 516.21 pounds of fat.
