Maurice Hillis is ill at his home this week.

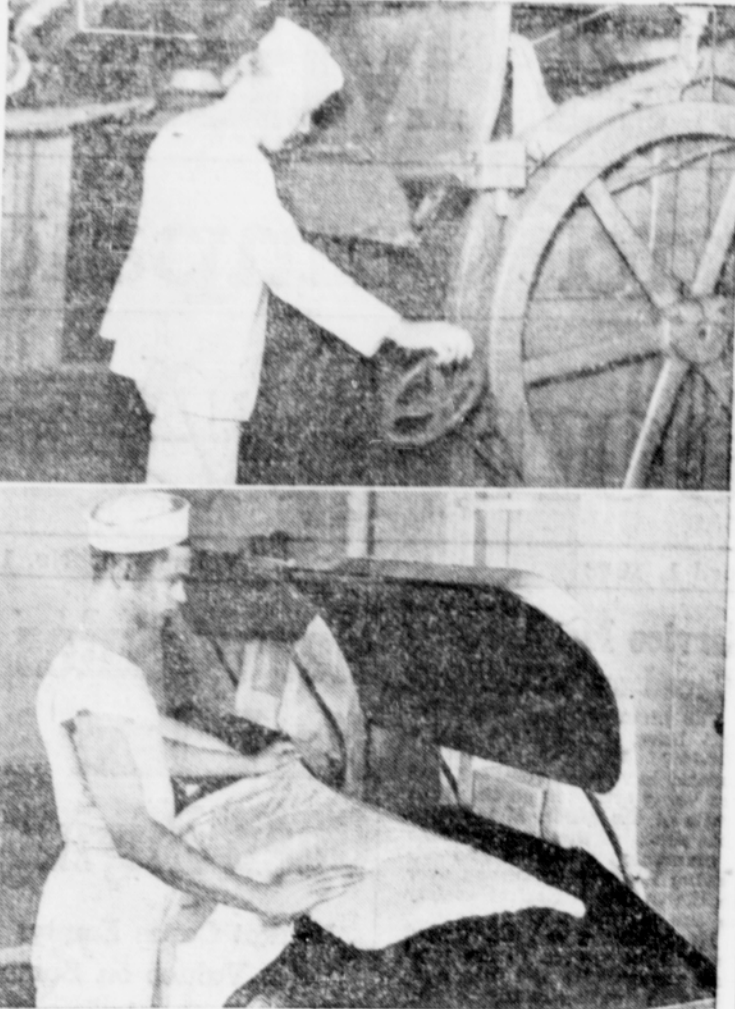
