country has a surplus of apples that can be turned into cans or jugs of apple juice.
May Be Back Later
Dried fruits were left on the official chart, at zero value, as a reminder that they may be rationed again when the new crop is packed.

The basic ration for canned goods remains at 48 points per month per person, while the weekly allotment for meat per person is 16 points. The meat stamps that became usable Monday were the red A stamps in ration book No. 2. The following week unused red A, plus the red B stamps, will be usable, accumulating until the first four weeks' meat stamps expire together on April 30.

No registration and no declaration of meats, cheese, butter, etc., on hand was required. This includes food locker stocks.
Because the first point list made the smallest size cans 4 oz. and less, more attractive "point-wise" than the large size cans, the new table raises values by one to two points for many items in the "over 0 including 4 oz." column.
No change is made in baby foods, which continue to be valued at one point for the ordinary small can of strained foods.

In the frozen fruits and vegetables, minor increases of a point or two are made in several weight classifications, although the popular ten-ounce, twelve-ounce, and sixteen-ounce sizes are undisturbed. The revisions are made in recognition of the fact that the weight classifications for canned goods are

Flax Plant Plans Receive Approval

is between 85 and 90 pounds per acre. Seeding may be done with a drill but care should be taken not to get the seed too deep. About one-half inch is ample depth, the county agent stated, and poor results from deeper seeding are the usual experience. However, the seed must be firm if uniform seeding is going to be obtained.

Flax fields that are infested with broad leaved annual weeds may be sprayed with a selective weed killer about the time the flax is six or eight inches tall. Good control of this type of weed may be obtained.

Fast Growing Spring Crop
Flax is a fast growing spring crop that is usually ready to pull sometime in July. According to Hyslop, 19 new pullers will be available for the Willamette valley and if Washington county farmers grow between 1200 and 1500 acres, 10 or 12 pullers should be obtained.

As there is only one other new plant being built these pullers may be able to take care of local needs. Clover and alfalfa seed or corn ground are highly desirable for flax while good returns may be obtained from most any ground of fair fertility that is reasonably well drained.

The average yield of flax in the Willamette valley throughout a period of 14 years has been 17 tons per acre. Under present flour

Borrowers Should Contact Committee

Any FSA borrowers interested in the growing of fiber flax should make arrangements to do so through a committee elected for the purpose of furthering the growing of flax in Washington county. Information on this essential war crop is available in the county agent's office.

Victor Madsen reports that he grew flax a number of years prior to his present work as FSA supervisor and considers it a good cash crop that can well be substituted for some of the spring grain crops.

The recommended seeding time is March through the first half of April, according to Madsen.
