More Planning Meals Required

Point rationing requires more planning ahead than homemakers have heretofore done. A good diet can be obtained under the point system but not without some careful planning and preferably a written plan of meals for the coming week. The allowance of red stamp points per week is 16 per person. The allowance of blue stamp points per week is approximately 11 per person. For a family of four this would be equivalent to 64 red stamp points per week and 44 blue stamp points per week.

It is suggested that the homemaker write down a week's meal plans, with 2 columns at the side. Write the number of blue points required for the foods for each day in one column and the number of red points in the other column. If the sum of the points in the week's plan exceed the rationed allowance, change the meal plans to foods with lower points or to unrationed foods.

Making a week's meal plan is especially necessary to people who do not raise their own food. It is particularly important to include the essential foods in family meals to serve adequate amounts of milk; oranges, tomatoes, or raw leafy greens; green or yellow vegetables; potatoes; other vegetables and fruits; eggs and other protein foods; whole grain and enriched cereal products; and bread and water. Among the important unrationed foods are milk, eggs, fresh vegetables, fresh fruits, dried fruits (apples), cereals, flour, bread and nuts and nut products. Grocery advertisements are helpful in choosing point foods. A newspaper clipping or other printed list of point values is a necessity in the homemaker's file. It is necessary to keep it up to date by listening to radio news announcements and by reading the newspapers. The purpose of rationing is to assure fair distribution of scarce foods.

Poynter Speaks On Delinquency

Methods of dealing with the child delinquency problem were outlined by J. W. Poynter, Hillsboro grade school superintendent, in a talk before the Lions club Wednesday noon. He stated that the problem was one of social maladjustment rather than delinquency.

Children must learn to respect their authorities—home, school and city, according to Poynter. First evidences of delinquency are lying and stealing, followed by unexcused absences from school.

Poynter stated that in facing the problem schools first endeavor to find out what is in the home, may cause the delinquency, then determine what about school is unattractive to the child and finally attempt by self analysis to have the child reason out why he did the objectionable things. The last resort in solving the problem is the juvenile court.

Rainfall Record Above Normal

About one-seventh of the normal annual rainfall for this area was received in a week time the end of March, according to A. W. Moore, co-operative observer for the U. S. weather bureau for this community. The normal annual rainfall here is about 42 inches.

The rainfall readings were as follows: March 26, 6.0; 27th, 1.03; 28th, .94; 29th, .62; 30th, .31; 31st, 1.87; April 1, .16; 2nd, .13; 3rd, trace; 4th, trace; 5th, .07; 6th, 0.
