been taken there after he faked an appendicitis attack. He hid in homes of Norwegian friends, but returned to prison voluntarily after a few days because the Germans had threatened to arrest those who had given him shelter.

A few more weeks in prison convinced him he ought to make an attempt to escape via the hospital route. He deliberately dropped his cot on his arm, breaking it. Back to the hospital he went, but before he could escape, he was transferred to Germany.

Exchanged for a German prisoner held by the United States, Jacobsen arrived home in July, 1941.

Jacobsen will explain organization of civilian defense in Norway during his talk.
