ODT Certificates Not Transferable
Certificates of war necessity and "T" ration gasoline coupons may not be transferred along with titles to trucks or other commercial vehicles, the Office of Defense Transportation stated recently. The act directly violates general order ODT 21, Herman O. Sites, district ODT manager, pointed out, and may be punished by suspension or revocation of certificates.

New operators receiving a motor vehicle through transfer must file an application for CWN immediately upon the transfer. Operators who already hold certificates must apply for new certificates, using form CWN-5-S if a single unit operator, or form 5-F if a fleet operator. Failure to file such applications may also result in suspension of the operator's CWN, Sites said.

Operators of one or two vehicles must return certificates to their local war price and rationing boards upon transfer. Fleet operators must advise the nearest ODT district office of their action and return the appropriate sub-certificates.

Operators changing their area of operation or substantially changing the nature of their business must inform their local ODT district office of such changes. Changes of address should also be reported promptly.

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Enrollment Now Being Taken for Red Cross Functional Swim Program

To provide instruction in water-manship needed to meet war conditions, the American Red Cross has devised a special kind of aquatic training which will be put into operation locally through Washington County Red Cross chapter, according to Bob Lisetschski, vice-chairman of the water safety committee for Washington county.

Functional swimming and water safety, as this special course is called, has been successfully conducted with armed forces for more than a year and now will be made available for persons of or near service age, either men or women.

In this war, the ability to take care of oneself in the water, or to save another, is being recognized as being of more importance than in any previous war in our history," the vice chairman said.

According to reports, approximately 12 per cent of the young men in the armed forces can swim well enough to save their own lives; the rest cannot swim well enough to take care of themselves for more than a few minutes," asserted Lisetschski. "These are the men who will be transported across hundreds of miles of open water to the various theatres of war and will be called upon to cross and recross rivers and streams in the fighting zones."

Since time spent in military and naval training centers is short and facilities often are inadequate to take care of the large numbers of men who need aquatic instruction, the military leaders have advised the Red Cross that the entire situation will be greatly relieved and greatly improved if those of service age can receive special aquatic training before they enter the armed forces, according to the chairman, Mrs. J. E. West.

Co-operation of all community organizations including senior high schools, colleges, universities, local associations, clubs, and industrial groups will be asked. The new course will be limited to young men and women of or near draft age.

The chapter also offers three other courses, namely, a class for beginners in swimming, a junior life saving course for those children of 12 to 17 years, and a senior life saving course of those ages, 17 years and up. Those interested may enroll in Hillsboro at the following places: The Argus, Mrs. McKinney, McPeck Furniture Co., Mrs. J. E. West, the attendant on duty at the Red Cross room in the Hill theatre building, in Forest Grove at the schools and the Times office. Enrollment is now being taken and everyone is urged to sign up early to assure them of a place in the water safety program.

Registrations are also being taken at the Hillsboro union high school and many have already registered there.
