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Summary Shows Crop Acreage

Uncertainty over the amount of labor, machinery and supplies that will be available is not stopping Oregon farmers from an all-out effort to meet 1943 war production goals, final tabulations of the farm mobilization survey, as reported by the state AAA office, disclose.

A summary of the 1943 farm plans for 52,543 of the state's approximately 60,000 farms shows that Oregon farmers intend to grow more of the needed crops and raise more livestock and poultry than they did last year. The survey, covering 18,500,000 acres of crop, pasture and range land, was made by 100 AAA community committees during February and March.

Less than one-half of one percent of Oregon's cropland will be idle this year, the farm plan summary shows. The report on 1943 intentions also shows that state goals for three vital war crops will be met, plantings of nearly all important crops will be increased, more livestock will be raised than ever before, and poultry production, both for eggs and meat, will be increased sharply.

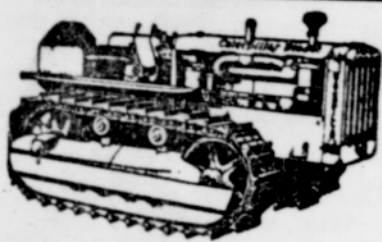

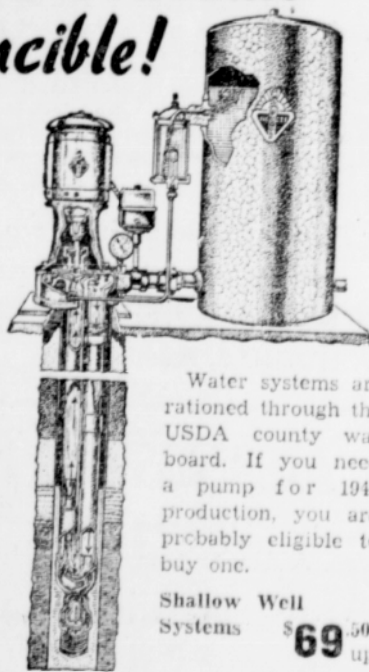

Large Acreage Vegetable Seed Crops Planned

Six hundred acres of vegetable seed crops will be grown for local demands in this general area in the 1944 harvest through E. F. Burlingham & Sons, Forest Grove, according to W. F. Cyrus, announcement of this contract with the Food Distribution Administration of the U. S. D. A. was made last week. The acreage includes onion, turnip, rutabaga, cabbage, and carrot seed. Providing average yields are obtained the total gross value of the processed seed would be not less than one quarter million dollars.

Not all of the acreage will be grown in Washington county, but a considerable percentage of it will be placed with local farmers. The cabbage seed will for the most part be grown in the Oregon coastal area. Some of the other species need to be located carefully to avoid mixtures and crosses with wild plants of similar species and with cultivated plants of the same species but other varieties.

Growing vegetable seed crops is not an entirely new venture for some local farmers, according to the Forest Grove concern. Radish, turnip, and onion seed have been grown in Washington county at various times during the past fifteen years, and some growers already producing these crops at the present time.

Scholls Dairy Gratifies Plans

SCHOLLS—A herd of eighteen cows on the Harold Waldron farm here is the result of 23 years of close and careful building up from a small start, and every cow is a descendant of the original five purchased from a Dayton breeder in 1920. Calamity attended the beginning of the Waldron dairy in the first year, when the thoroughbred cow, bought with \$65, was killed by a week after purchase, but the farmer kept on, breeding and selecting until he has reached his present gratifying set-up, with a record of 42 pounds of butterfat per month. The sire of the herd is Coronation Dreaming Tip Sam, who became one of the principals in an accident that almost proved fatal to one of the heifer calves on the place, one day last week.

The new book contains 24 pages of blanks for listing farm receipts and operating expenditures by months. Space is also provided for a monthly summary of farm receipts and expenditures and a depreciation record for farm improvements, machinery, equipment and a breeding and work stock. Several other miscellaneous blanks are included for recording items needed in making income tax returns and in keeping a record of farm operations.

As an extra convenience, though not connected with the cash account records, there is a page for keeping a crop record and another page which contains frequently used information such as rules for measuring, various weights and measures, and a gestation table.

Now that federal income tax returns are required of every farmer on a farm or elsewhere, that has \$1200 or more of annual gross income it will pay every farm family in dollars and cents to keep at least the kind of records provided for in this new account book, says Torvond. Experience has shown that those who keep regular records will save on their income taxes, as it is easier to forget expenditures than it is receipts.

The actions on poultry violations in markets in poultry 1:16 court actions have been started by OPA against violators of poultry price ceilings in 21 days. More over, 21 other dealers have been warned to drop over-the-ceiling sales or face suspension of their licenses. Sweeping changes in poultry price ceilings were recently announced as part of the campaign to stop illegal sales, with prices reduced from 1 cent to 10 cents per pound on expensive birds and raised 1 or 2 cents per pound for cheaper poultry.

War Ration Book No. 3
War ration book No. 3 will be distributed through the mails to more than 120,000 individuals beginning late in June and ending July 21, the OPA has announced. Mailmen will leave postcard application forms at every home between May 20 and June 5. The postcard properly filled out by the head of the house and mailed to OPA, will bring ration book No. 3. Prentiss M. Brown, price administrator, emphasized that book No. 3 is a replacement book only, containing a new supply of stamps to take the place of those now being used. He said if any more rationing programs were necessary there would be official notice by the government.

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Small Farm Purchases Require No Priorities

Farmers do not need priority ratings to purchase such items as pipe, water well casing, nails, staples, wire or fencing, the state USDA war board reports. The War Production Board's controlled materials plan permits dealers to sell up to \$10 of any of these pipe or wire items to anyone without restriction. Amounts up to 4000 pounds may be sold to one purchaser in any calendar quarter if a specified certification of the dealer is furnished. Farms whose quarterly needs exceed 4000 pounds of either pipe or wire products may apply to their county farm rationing committee for a purchase certificate.
