Pioneers, Native Sons, Daughters Meet on June 27

Annual meeting of the Washington County Pioneers and Native Sons and Daughters association will be held Sunday, June 27, at the Shute park auditorium. A potluck dinner will be served at noon in the park, with coffee and sugar supplied.

A tentative afternoon program has been arranged. Harvey Starkweather of Portland is expected to talk on the Oregon Trail with a map demonstration. An account of the part taken by Washington county men in the organization of the territorial government at Champoeg, May 2, 1843, will be presented by Miss Maud Sparks of Forest Grove.

An account of the first Methodist camp meeting, held on the Pacific coast July 12, 1843, which was convened about four miles north of Hillsboro will be given by John Brown, custodian of Washington county historical museum. Little Rhoda Pearson, a granddaughter of Mrs. Rhoda Pearson and a descendant of the pioneer McNamara family, will sing, and other numbers will be added.

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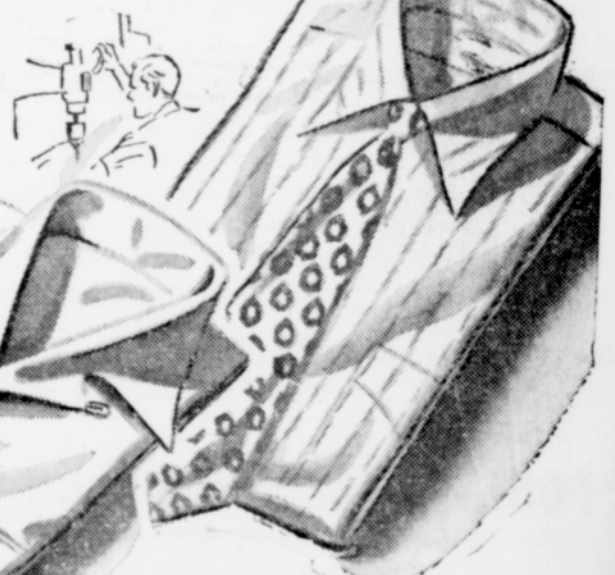
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
