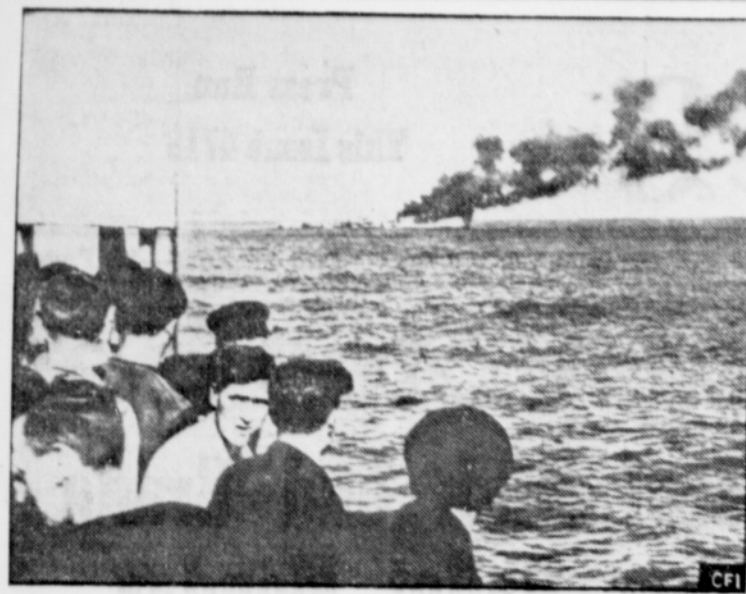




Cargo Meets Its End
