

"Old Oregon Trail" Theme of Meeting; Officers Re-elected

Giving a map demonstration narrative of the "Old Oregon Trail" Sunday at Shute park auditorium, Harvey Starkweather of Portland told members of the Pioneer and Native Sons and Daughters association that there was not a road in the United States that compared with it in sacrifice and the loss of life. Started in about 1840 the trail is more than 2000 miles long. Ten percent of the brave pioneers who started on the trek across the plains lost their lives en route, he said. Counting the graves, if placed in equal distance apart, would make 17 graves per mile. He gave the history of the trail from the time the pioneers left Independence, Mo., and lauded the indomitable courage which kept them coming west in spite of hardships.

Walter Meacham of Portland, executive secretary of the "Old Oregon Trail" centennial commission, told that he had been keenly interested in this history for more than 21 years. He assisted Ezra Meeker 21 years ago in organizing the "Old Oregon Trail" commission in Baker. Mr. Meacham's father came from Vermont, making the trip by boat around the horn, and his mother came from Pennsylvania on one of the first Union Pacific trains to come west.

On July 5 a monument will be unveiled at Baker, he said, which marks an historical spot on the trail. Dr. Howard R. Driggs of New York, president of the American Pioneer Trails association, will be present for the unveiling. Mr. Meacham told many human interest stories of the pioneer trek across the plains. He also advocated that Oregon history should be taught in the public schools, beginning with the third grade. He said that he had asked several pupils if they knew the story of the "Star of Oregon" and found that they had never heard about it. This was the boat built by Joseph Gale and associates and sailed to San Francisco. It was there sold Washington county farmers. Also that the history of Joseph L. Meek of near Hillsboro, who called for the deciding vote at Champoug, was not so well known as it should be. Speaking of the early history of Oregon, he said: "If we don't perpetuate it, who will?"

Mr. Meacham announced that the week beginning August 15 would be observed as "Pioneer Week," and that displays should be made in store windows of old pioneer relics. He reported that he had appointed Mrs. Emma McKinney as chairman of the week's observance in Hillsboro. From August 19 to 22 the American Pioneer Trails association meeting will be held in Portland, with Dr. Driggs presiding. In closing, Mr. Meacham recited the poem, "Little Mother of the Golden West," dedicated to pioneer women.

Miss Maud Sparks of Forest Grove had written a history of the eleven county group of Champoug, and this was read by her sister, Mrs. Anna Bellinger.

The 11 Washington county men who took part in the memorable day at Champoug were Joseph L. Meek, Joseph Gale, George W. Edwards, Rev. John S. Griffin, Charles McKay, David Hill, Alvin T. Smith, William Doughty, Rev. Harry Clark, Dr. Robert Newell, and Caleb Wilkins.

John Brown, president, gave a brief report of the first religious meeting to be held in the county—a camp meeting at Glencoe, E. C. Brown, son of Tabitha Brown, a pioneer woman who laid the foundation for Pacific university by starting a school for orphan children which grew into Tuatlatin academy and then Pacific university. He gave some facts about his family. Mr. Brown, who is 82 years old, said that he was of the fifth generation of United States Browns, his ancestors having come to America from England.

Other program numbers included the invocation by Rev. Caroline Blanchard, Portland, a pioneer teacher of Washington county; singing of America led by Mrs. L. E. Wilkes, with L. C. Mosher as accompanist; piano solos by Rhoda Rhoda Pearson, a descendant of the Pioneer McNamee family, singing of old-time favorites by Mrs. V. W. Gardner, accompanied by Mrs. Fred Seavel, and singing of a hymn by R. A. Cudde.

The Hillsboro Garden club arranged floral decorations and made bouquets and boutonnières for men and women over 75 years of age. Mrs. L. C. Mosher had charge of presenting the flowers.

It was announced that Mrs. Edythe Tozier Weathered, a member of the organization who rarely attended a meeting, was in a critical condition at a Portland hospital, that Mrs. R. B. Collins, crowned as Mother Queen several years ago, and Mrs. J. H. Grabel, another member, were in the Jones hospital. Bouquets were sent to these ladies.

Proceeding the program, election of officers was held, with all being re-elected. John M. Brown, president, Mrs. L. C. Mosher, vice-president, and Miss Mabel Hansen, secretary-treasurer.

Beware of Wartime Jitters, Warns Red Cross Nutritionist

Beware of wartime jitters among children," is the warning of the American Red Cross Nutrition Service.

Sketchy meals, served at irregular hours, without adequate advance planning, take their toll from children's nerves. Frequent colds, irritability, peevishness and disobedience are often symptoms in children of poorly balanced or deficient diets.

The impact of war has brought numerous changes in family life, according to Mrs. John Kovaly, chairman of the county chapter nutrition service. Many mothers are purchasing and preparing much of the food.

In numerous cases both parents work outside the home and eat their heavy meal at noon, while the children are given a light lunch. Under these existing schedules, the mother too frequently prepares a light lunch at night and the children are "cheated" of a substantial and vital evening meal.

War adds to the urgency of a health building program and health care only be built upon good diet. Mrs. Kovaly said. Shortages of food commodities cannot be permitted to impair children's welfare. Meals must be carefully planned to provide daily food essentials and satisfy appetites. Children need the same food as adults, but with more generous servings of some, such as milk, eggs, whole grain cereals, which are rich in substances children need for growth.

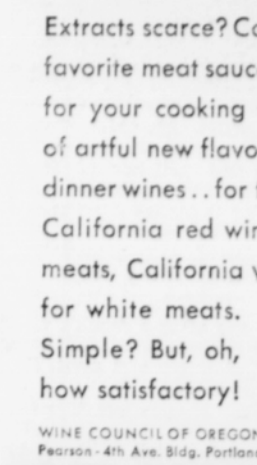
