SCHOLLS—After making a record of thirty years of continuous service as clerk of the Gromer school, Henry Hesse resigned at the meeting of the board held Monday evening, and Mrs. Jesse Snyder Jr. was elected to his place. Mr. Hesse is believed to hold the record for the county. Earl Stretcher also retired as director and his place was taken by Lawrence Flint. Minor Hesse will be chairman for the coming year.
