Washington county is now the proud possessor of an attractive "Victory Center" located on the south side of Main street, between the Penney store and the Shaker shop. The structure is independent hall, which formerly served as the Portland Victory Center building at the corner of Sixth and Morrison streets.

The structure has been in storage in one of the equipment yards of the George H. Buckler company in Portland since construction of Portland's new Victory Center building began. The big job of moving the building got under way Thursday and was completed Friday.

Arrangements for putting it back in service as the Washington county "Victory Center" at Hillsboro were made by the state war bond staff and H. L. MacKenzie and J. L. Seery, county and city war bond leaders.

A coat of paint is promised by Chairman MacKenzie for Independence hall now that it is back in "active duty."

Hillsboro Retail Merchants Off to Good Start in 'Shangri-La' Campaign

In the Hillsboro merchants' participation in the "Shangri-La" war bond and stamp drive, the Sprague-Holt store has already exceeded its quota in the July, 1942, retail merchant participation. For the first seven days or just five business days, it sold \$202.15 in war savings stamps and \$573 in bonds for a total of \$775.25 against sales for the month of July in 1942 of approximately \$750.

Following the retail merchants' meeting last week at which plans for participation were made, Manager Carl Weber met with his clerks and left the matter of quota up to their decision and they finally decided on \$300 each or a total of \$1800, which with sales to date means that they are up to nearly 50 per cent of quota within five business days.

Sales of bonds and stamps up to today for the July retail drive have amounted to \$2800 at Wells Department store, which is featuring a special window devoted to "The Dollar for Jimmy Doolittle's mystery ship, the 'Shangri-La'."

Wells store was designated several months ago by the treasury department as an official selling agent for war bonds and stamps and has continuously promoted such purchases.

Bond and stamp sales for the first week "Shangri-La" drive at the local J. C. Penney company store approximate \$1300, according to Manager P. A. Anderson. Quota set by the 1940 Penney stores for the month of July is \$1000,000. The July, 1942, quota was \$1200,000 based on 4 per cent of retail sales as suggested by the treasury department, and district 20, comprising the stores in Oregon and

Applications Being Received for Big Game Tags for the 1943 Season

Applications are now being accepted by the Oregon State Game commission for the various special big game tags to be issued for the 1943 hunting season. Applications will be kept on file and if by August 16, more applications are received than the specified quota of tags, then a drawing will be held to determine the issuance. If the quota for any particular allotment of tags is not reached by August 16, then all applications on hand will be filled, and the rest of the tags issued in the order applications are received until all tags are sold.

A person may apply for a tag by sending in to the game commission office at 615 Oregon building, Portland, the specified fee and information as to the type of tag desired, number and kind of hunting license held, and name and address. This information may be mailed in a letter or on a special application form that has been prepared for the purpose.

There will be 2,500 doe tags issued for Grant county but only for a certain area lying north of the highway between Canyon City and Dayville. The part south of the highway where doe hunting has been previously allowed will not be open this fall. For the Lake-Klamath area, 6,000 doe tags will be issued, and for the Steens mountain area, 1,000 tags. Persons wishing to apply for doe deer tags may apply for only one of these three areas. Fees for the tags are: \$3.50 for residents and \$5 for non-residents. Open season for deer is from October 1 to November 2.

The cow elk area has been changed somewhat from last year and 2,000 tags at \$5 for residents and \$25 for non-residents will be issued for the following areas: Starting at the junction of the Oregon-Washington state line and state highway No. 11 between Pendleton and Walla Walla, proceed to Pendleton on highway No. 11; thence east on U. S. highway No. 30 to Kamela; turn south on forest road past Flat lake guard station to junction of Mt. Emily logging road; thence southeasterly

to Grande Ronde river road; proceed in southeasterly direction to Sheep ranch and Chicken creek road; thence easterly on forest service road over Anthony lakes summit to junction with U. S. highway No. 30 at North Powder; thence north on the U. S. highway No. 30 to H. H. Lake; thence east along township line between T3S to T4S to forest service road; thence north on road to the town of Lostine on state highway No. 82; and from Lostine northwesterly on state highway No. 82 to Elgin; thence north along Grande Ronde river to Washington state line; thence west on state line to point of starting.

The entire state will be open to bull elk hunting from October 26 to November 20 while elk of either sex may be taken in an area in southeastern Oregon bounded on the north by highway No. 28 and on the west by highways 97, 62 and 99.

For the antelope area in Lake, Harney and Malheur counties, 2,500 tags have been authorized at \$2.50 each for residents and \$5 for non-residents. Open season is from September 18 to October 2.

The federal government has deemed it advisable to reduce the deer herds in a certain portion of the Hart Mountain National Antelope refuge and for this purpose authorization has been granted to issue 250 buck deer and 400 doe deer tags for the western part of the reserve, the open season to be October 9 to 24, inclusive. These tags will be sold at \$3.50 for residents and \$5 for non-residents and may be applied for in addition to the other doe tags mentioned before.
