FORT GEORGE WRIGHT, Wash.—Warrant Officer Bruce E. West, son of Major John E. West of Hillsboro, has been assigned to headquarters of the Second Bomber Command here as acting assistant A-1, Personnel.

The Second Bomber Command was recently activated in the Second Air Force and is training combat crews and units for heavy bombardment groups in overseas organizations at bases throughout the northwest. It is under the command of Brigadier General Eugene L. Eubank, who led the famous 19th Group against the Japs in the Philippines, Java and from Australia.

Warrant Officer West entered the service directly from Placer Junior college. Once in the army, he attended engineering and operations clerical schools at Lowry Field and Fort Logan, Denver, Colo. 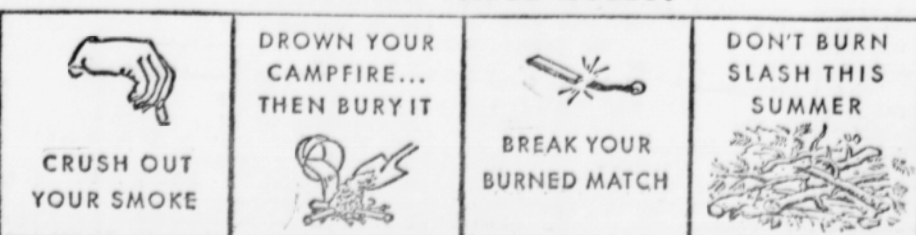
FOREST FIRES
