Name of Former 4-H'er Given to New Warship

A former Oregon 4-H club boy who was killed in an attack on Kiska harbor, has had his name given to a warship recently launched. The ship is a "trooper" escort vessel built at Houston, Texas.

Lloyd Jones Mills was a 4-H club member who lived near Cove and was active in club work in the early thirties. After eight years of club work he was awarded a Carl Raymond Gray scholarship and later graduated from Whitman college.

He joined the air force soon after war broke out and was killed while participating in an attack on Japanese vessels at Kiska. He was awarded the distinguished flying cross posthumously.

Pioneer Grower Of Hops Dies

FOREST GROVE—Funeral services for Frank J. Miller, who died July 18, were held Monday afternoon at the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel and interment was in Forest View cemetery.

Known throughout the United States as the nation's only Bohemian hop grower, Miller was Oregon's oldest hop grower, and probably its oldest hop buyer. He harvested his first crop of Bohemians in 1936, after eight years of experimentation, from 14,000 plants. It was the result of propagation of three cuttings in 1929 grown from an imported Bohemian root brought to this county in 1930.

Last year with an estimated 25,000 pounds from 23 acres, he harvested the crop in five days the first week in August. This year's crop would have been his 49th consecutive one, and his seventh Bohemian.

A pioneer, Miller was born in a covered wagon in a train heading for Oregon. It was January 8, 1863, that he was born as the train was in the vicinity of Boise. The family settled in Salem, and later his father, John, moved to Forest Grove, bringing trees on pony-back from the hills. A valued family possession is the original blueprint of the grounds in 74 Alexander and Emily Dr. Miller bought a farm at Yamhill, and it was on the home farm that young Miller planted his first hop yard.

Miller had made his home in Forest Grove since 1909, with frequent trips to California where he owned an orange orchard at one time. He started buying hops for several New York firms in 1900 and maintained an office in Portland. Since 1929 he had devoted most of his time to the propagation and planting of the midwest-resistant Bohemians, having burned out 36 acres of English clusters in 1936.

Deceased is survived by the widow, Mrs. L. J. Miller, and three children, Mrs. J. J. Miller, Mrs. J. J. Miller, and Mrs. J. J. Miller.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Monday at the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel. Interment will be in Forest View cemetery.

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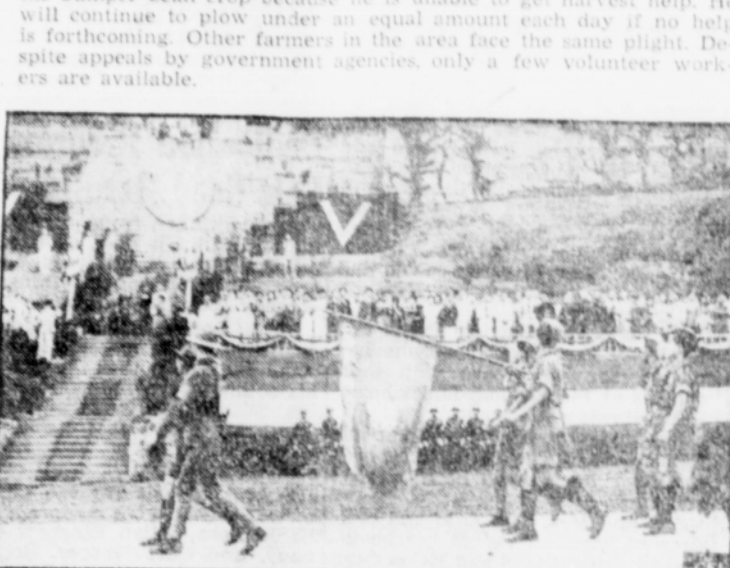

Cigarette Brands to Stay Any rumors that OPA plans to reduce or eliminate cigarette brands or brand names, or to provide for only one cigarette, "are absolutely baseless," Price Administrator Prentiss M. Brown declared recently.

Prosecute Gas Ration Violators Criminal prosecutions for violation of gasoline rationing regulations instituted by OPA through April 30, 1943, totaled 599. Ninety-three cases involved operators of gasoline stations. The remaining 416 were actions against individuals ranging from private automobile owners and filling station attendants to criminal "rings" engaged in systematic theft and sale of stolen gasoline ration books and coupons.

Savers Garden Seed Cautioned

Many victory gardeners who plan to save their own seed for next year will need to find out which are safe to save and which will be likely to be damaged by cross pollination, says O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist.

In general, beans, peas, lettuce and tomato seed can be saved with no advance precautions. Sweet corn may be contaminated if grown within 250 yards of other corn.

Varieties of cucumbers, muskmelons and watermelons will each cross with other varieties, but the three do not intercross. Summer squash varieties cross with each other and with Cucurbit field pumpkin, but not with the Hubbard group.

Many types of garden vegetables such as kale, cabbage, beets, carrots and parsnips are biennials and produce seed the second year. When these are in bloom in their second season most of them cross freely among varieties and sometimes with related or wild plants.

County agents can give more detailed information on this subject. Most types of left-over seed can safely be saved and used next year. Types good for one to three years include beans, corn, onions, parsley, parsnip, peas and salsify. Most others are good from four to 10 years.
