Army Transport Officer Guest
Lieutenant-Colonel James P. Bates of Portland, home on brief furlough, was a guest of his brother, Harry Bates, and family here Saturday. Colonel Bates, who is an army transport commander, left a partnership in the Portland firm of Oliphant & Bates insurance agency, 17 months ago to become a major in the army. Most of this time he has dodged submarines in the seven seas for more than 70,000 nautical miles aboard a transport.

He has been in command of all military personnel aboard from the time the ship sails to the time she reaches her destination. His duties have led him to all theatres of war. Italian prisoners, who have sailed under Bates, have been in nearly all instances happy to get out of the fighting, and very pessimistic about their country's fate in the present conflict, he said. The Germans, on the other hand prior to the Nazi regime would emerge victorious.

Although several submarines have threatened Bates' ship, the torpedoes have missed their mark. Within 11 days after he entered the service he was on the high seas on duty. He has been in the army reserve for 20 years and during World War I, Bates was an enlisted man in France with the 13th infantry.

Colonel and Mrs. Bates have one son in the army, Lt. E. P. Bates, who is somewhere between here and Burma. Their first son, the late Ensign James P. Bates Jr., was lost in action last May in the Orkney islands.

One \$18.75 war bond will give an army enlisted man an overcoat, two woolen undershirts, and a pair of light woolen socks.
