Two State Funds Sent to Counties

Two fund apportionments from state revenue went out to Oregon cities and counties recently, according to Secretary of State Bob Farrell.

Counties of the state received \$800,000 as their July payment from the state highway fund. Payments were made in accordance with the number of motor vehicles registered in each county in 1942. The second portion of the 1943 payment, totaling \$1,200,000, will be paid in December.

The quarterly distribution of revenue derived from liquor taxes amounted to \$31,399.05. This money was distributed to cities on a population basis. With the first quarterly payment this makes a total of \$97,827.59 Oregon cities received for the first half of 1943.

Government Needs Library Assistants

New examination to meet anticipated needs for library assistants in federal agencies was announced this week by the U. S. Civil Service commission. Persons qualifying may be appointed to positions paying \$1970 and \$1732 a year.

Library assistants in naval air and training stations will replace enlisted men going to sea. No specific experience or education is required to compete in the test, or to be eligible for appointment to the \$1732 position. Applicants must meet certain experience or training requirements in addition to passing the test to qualify for the \$1970 position. There are no age limits.

Persons desiring to take the test must file applications with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Full information and forms may be obtained from Fred Holzmagel, commission's local secretary at the Hillsboro post office or from the civil service commission.
