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## Sugar Allowance For Jams Boosted To Five Pounds

Housewives will be glad to learn that the OPA has allowed increased amounts of sugar this year for jams, jellies and preserves. The district OPA announced today.

Out of the top limit of 25 pounds of sugar per person permitted for home canning of this season's fruit crop, five pounds per person may be used for jams and jellies. It was explained. This is a more generous allowance than last year when only four pounds of fruit, will be considerably less.

Where a consumer has already received a home canning sugar allowance from the board since March 1, 1943, she may not use stamp 15 or 16 to obtain sugar if in so doing for preserves was limited to one pound per person.

Stamps 15 and 16 in war ration book 1 are good for five pounds of sugar each so this reduces the amount of sugar which can be issued by local rationing boards to 15 pounds. It was emphasized by the OPA that the 25 pounds is a maximum allowance and that to total sugar requirements of most consumers, based on one pound per quart of fruit, will be considerably less.

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
