

Old Oregon Trail Commission Plans "Historical Exhibit"

The Old Oregon Trail Centennial commission has designated the week of August 13 as "Historical Exhibit Week," and it is urged that all local merchants donate the use of a window to exhibit pioneer relics.

Annual convention of the American Pioneer Trails association will be held in Portland August 19 to 21 as the closing event of Historical Exhibit Week. Dr. Howard R. Briggs of New York, president of the American Pioneer Trails association, will be the principal speaker, according to Walter Meacham, executive secretary of the Old Oregon Trail Centennial commission.

Mrs. W. R. Manley of the D. A. R. has been named as chairman of the Hillsboro exhibit with P. L. Patterson as assistant.

Hillsboro and Washington county are rich in pioneer relics, and the Tozier collection which was presented to this county several years ago has been augmented by some relics which Mrs. Edythe Tozier Weathered had retained in her

possession until her death several weeks ago.

Residents of Hillsboro and Washington county having pioneer relics of any kind for exhibit are requested to notify the Argus office, or John M. Brown, historian, at the library building, entrance on west side. Relics will be well cared for and returned to exhibitor.

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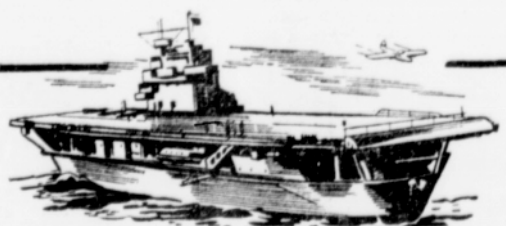
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
