"WAKE UP, AMERICA!"

Should the Federal Government Subsidize Education?

DR. CARR OPENS: The Federal Government should appropriate money to the States for schools because: First, the National Government has a life-and-death interest in education. An educated citizenry is the only basis upon which popular government can operate efficiently. Second, each State is affected by the quality of education in every other State. Third, only through the Federal tax system can all incomes be taxed where they are in order to educate all children where they live. Fourth, many States do not have enough wealth to give all children a satisfactory education. Space will not admit supporting evidence, but that evidence is conclusive. Fifth, aid to education is a national policy inaugurated in 1893. Grants to colleges have been made regularly since 1862. Sixth, Federal grants will not take education away from the people of the locality. The notion that control of education inevitably and always follows all types of financial grants is not supported by our long experience. If we really want to secure a complete Federal system of education, we need only to continue to drain all the tax resources to Washington, refuse to allocate any part of it back to States and localities for education, and thus starve local school districts out of business.

DR. SAXON CHALLENGES: The Supreme Court has not declared education to be interstate commerce. The Federal Constitution gives no jurisdiction to the Federal Government in this field. The State of Pennsylvania pays almost 45% of its total expenditures annually to the advancement of education. The Department of Education, in most major states, has become the major spending agency. Because certain backward southern states fail to spend a like percentage, state expenditures for education is much smaller. This should be corrected by popular opinion within each state—not used as an excuse to siphon money out of New York to educate undereducated in Louisiana or Tennessee.

DR. CARR REPLIES: Professor Saxton says that in "certain backward Southern states" the percentage of total state expenditures for education is smaller than elsewhere. The facts are inconclusive for this line of argument. On the average, 23 percent of state operating expenditures are allotted to education. All the so-called "backward" Southern states of exceed this national average, most of them by a great deal.

Let us examine the evidence. A democratic equality of educational opportunity depends absolutely upon Federal subsidy to the states. Such subsidies have been granted, and can continue to be granted, without undesirable Federal control.

DR. SAXON REPLIES: Control of educational funds means control of legislation. Federal subsidy could easily destroy freedom of thought, writing and research and regiment students as viciously as the Germans have. Historically it is the final step toward totalitarian government. Political freedom rests upon freedom of education and freedom of speech. If no professor can teach unless he has federal approval, no textbook can be used unless it coincides with current administration policies, no student can be taught unless approved by the local Democratic or Republican boss, education will be a travesty and the four freedoms gone with the wind.

DR. CARR CHALLENGES: Professor Saxton thinks Federal aid to education "would mean destruction of our democracy." The Federal Government has aided state higher education without control since 1862. Our democracy has not been destroyed. Federal aid really destroys our democracy. It is to continue to allow sections of our people, through no fault of their own, to grow up poorly educated or not educated at all. Federal aid does not mean "inevitable" political domination of education. The pending Federal aid legislation (S. 637) specifically forbids any Federal officer to exercise any supervisory or control whatever over any school or state educational agency.

Warning Given on Radar Discussion
The extent of current public discussion of radar is causing increasing concern to the government, according to the office of censorship.

The principle of radar is generally understood here and abroad, and some of the disclosures have been made officially. New methods of applying the principle are being developed, however, and there is much the enemy does not know.

The fact of prior publication should not be used to cover added description, discussion, and deduction, or to support a theory or draw a conclusion.

Radar is a weapon within the meaning of the espionage laws, and broadcasters are especially requested to be alert to every mention of radar and military electronic devices to establish beyond all question that there is appropriate authority for every statement made; and to submit all material released by the subject—other than that released by appropriate government authority—to the office of censorship for review in advance of publication or broadcast.

So inclusive a request would not be made if the highest considerations of national security were not directly involved.

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Oregon Governor Designates AWS Week August 1-7

"Even before the president of these United States had appeared before congress to declare that a state of war existed between our country and the Japanese Empire, many of our loyal citizens were standing vigil at observation posts throughout the western slope of Oregon. These good people had taken part in an army air force maneuver in the latter part of October, 1941, and formed the nucleus for what has become the Ground Observer Corps and the Aircraft Warning Corps. These two great volunteer organizations blend to make up the vast Aircraft Warning Service of the United States Army Air Force. Many thousands of our citizens are members of the Aircraft Warning Service and have given many hours of their time, quite often at great sacrifice, to see that our observation posts, filter centers, and information centers are constantly manned 24 hours every day.

"In order that we may recognize the efforts of these
