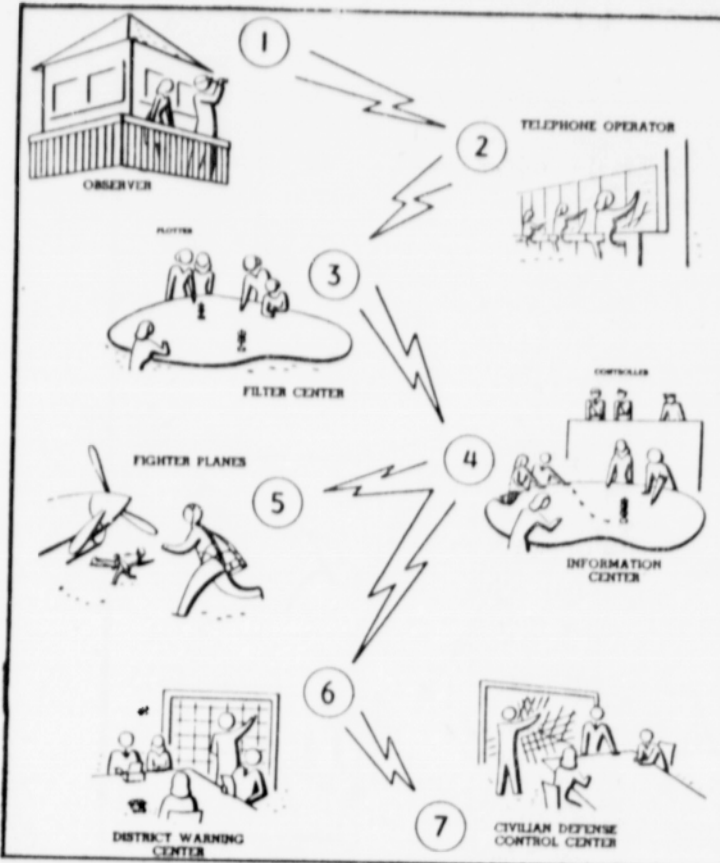

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How AWS Function The above schematic diagram depicts the complete action of the Aircraft Warning Service. The observer (1) sees a flight of aircraft and reports via telephone (2) to the Army Filter Center (3). The Filter Center plots and evaluates all observer reports and forwards the true course and strength of each flight to the Information Center (4). The Controller at the Information Center, using the accurate "flight picture" as a basis, can order fighter planes to intercept any hostile target and can issue a warning to Civilian Defense agencies (6) and (7).

THE AIRCRAFT WARNING SERVICE IS AN ESSENTIAL PART OF THE U. S. ARMY AIR FORCES

This winged emblem is the official insignia of the Aircraft Warning Service. You will notice that it has the words "U. S. Army Air Forces" lettered on it. Civilians who display it are a real part of our Air Forces.

150,000 loyal civilians know that Posts of the AWS must be filled. The job must be done by either civilians or by flyers or soldiers badly needed at our battle fronts. AWS volunteers release men and equipment for fighting duty.
