"Nicodemus ever spoke as this man," quite true for the throng stood speechless that day, while the police saw themselves in sin. So they looked on Jesus, His face, the face of a man, but His words, the words of God. How could they touch Him? He gave Himself up. But His hour had not yet come.

Would you speak the word and see the crowd come to death the woman taken in adultery. In the very act, as the Bible put it, "It was the law to stone her to death. Or would you set her free?" It raised no problem for our Lord, as they sought to trap Him in it. "He that is without sin among you, let him cast the first stone at her." And he acquiesced not one by one, from the eldest to the last.

"Where are these three accusers?" asked Jesus. They were gone. "Neither do I condemn thee. Go and sin no more." It was not yet His hour to sit in judgment, neither could they trap Him.

At the end, Christ bowed His head and tasted death for every man. The sentence that was against you was carried out against Him. Do not fear, receive Him as
