Red flags enclosed in glass should be substantially packed to avoid breakage. Sharp instruments, such as razors, and knives, must have their edges and points protected so that they cannot cut through the coverings and injure postal personnel or damage other packages.

Since the armed forces are being plentifully supplied with food and clothing, the army and navy recommend against these as gifts.

Addresses must be written clearly and completely. In addition to the return address of the sender, a parcel for an army man should show the name, rank, army serial number, branch of service, organization, army post office number, and name of post office through which the parcel is routed.

The address on a parcel for a navy man should include the name and rank or rating of the addressee, the naval unit to which he is assigned and the navy number assigned thereto, or the name of his ship, and the fleet postoffice through which the parcel is routed.

The postoffice department advises that Christmas packages and mail for service men and women known to be en route overseas, but whose relatives have not yet been informed of their overseas addresses, should be mailed to their last known addresses, from which it will be forwarded to the correct destination.
