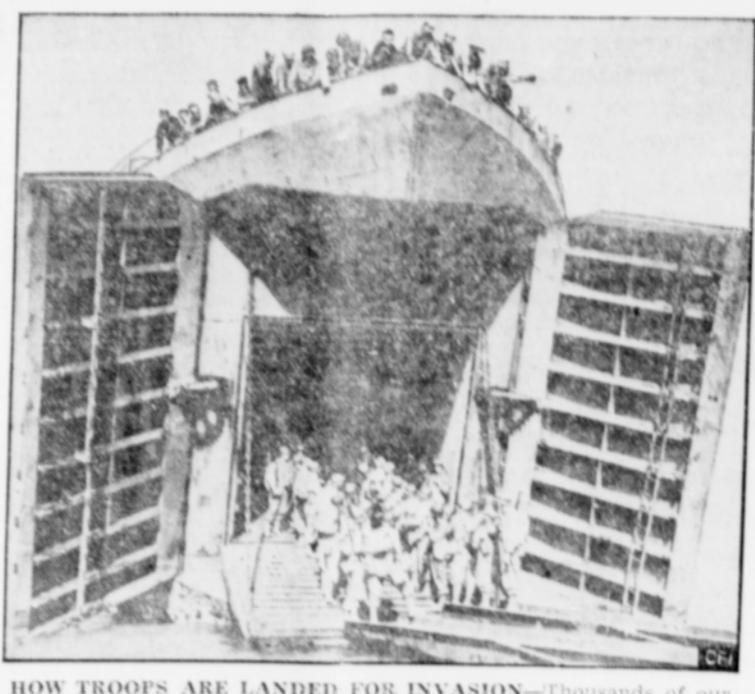
Mrs. A. Park was confined to her bed with the flu last week.

People Served By Printing of Public Notices

One of the less spectacular but nonetheless important functions of the newspapers of general circulation is to serve as a medium for public notices, sometimes as legal or official advertising. They are the most common and effective means of serving legal notice on individuals or the public, or both, of some contemplated move.

Publication of such notices makes the proposals in question a matter of record and affords those whose rights may be affected by them an opportunity to take what ever steps are necessary to protect those rights. Such publication in a medium of general circulation, followed by an adequate lapse of time, is required by law in hundreds of situations involving both private and public matters. The device is simple in principle, but it has been established for years as an essential part of the democratic process.

Another important type of public notice often found in the newspapers is in the form of periodical financial reports of political subdivisions or other public agencies such as school boards. These, too, are commonly required by law to be published. This is done to give the widest possible publicity to the expenditure of public funds and is thus a brake on possible official wrongdoing or methods that would not stand the test of such publicity.

There are times when newspapers feel it necessary to invoke the law to insure the publication of certain notices as provided by statute. In so doing, they frequently render another public service, for if they did not, the matter might go by default and in the long run some public interest would suffer as a result. For these and other reasons, the press performs an important public function in serving as the chief medium for most public notices. It claims no special credit for so doing, but the service

Co-operate with your community correspondent by turning in your important news happenings. It is impossible for the correspondent to contact everyone for local news items. Be sure that the item is real news and not just a mere day's visitation within the county or to Portland.
