

American Drive Forces German Retreat in Italy

A swift American drive that cut five miles into the left flank of the German lines in the Volturno valley of Italy, Wednesday forced the Nazis to fall back to a fresh mountain line, leaving behind them one of the war's worst scenes of destruction. The Nazis were reported to be burning houses, shooting civilians, destroying livestock, tearing up railroads, dynamiting roads and firing haystacks to provide smoke screens to cover their retreat.

Dnieper Bend Battle Rages

Driving swiftly through crumbling German defenses Wednesday inside the Dnieper bend, Russian mobile forces were reported making a scythe-like sweep which threatened encirclement of tens of thousands of Nazis in the Dnepropetrovsk area. House to house fighting was reported in Melitopol below the Dnieper bend.

Yank Bombers Open New Attack

United States heavy bombers, supported by Thunderbolts and Spitfires, attacked targets in Western Germany Wednesday, the first major operation since the destructive smash at Germany's big bearing plant at Schweinfurt October 14.

Jap Planes Riddled

Mitchell medium bombers Monday destroyed 60 Japanese planes in a new bombing assault on Rabaul, New Britain, according to a report from General MacArthur. The planes also sank at least three enemy ships, including a destroyer, in a low level strike. Planes destroyed brought Jap losses to 200 within the week.

Japs Gained in Guinea

Japanese ground success of unspecified extent in the area of Sattelberg in New Guinea Monday was reported by General MacArthur. The gain was the first for the enemy since early in September.

Subs Sink Jap Ships

American submarines have sunk 98 more Japanese merchant ships, bringing to 460 the number of enemy vessels sunk, probably sunk or damaged since the war started, according to a release by Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox Tuesday.

Nazis Plan Strategy

Adolph Hitler Tuesday held his second strategy session in two weeks. It is presumed the parley was to explore avenues of escape from the consequences of total defeat.

Hull, Eden in Russia

Secretary of State Cordell Hull and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden are in Moscow for tri-power conference.

Jap Plan Loss Heavy

A Japanese attempt to wrest the initiative from the allies in the Southwest Pacific war in the air has cost them 104 planes shot down
