### Oregon Leader Quinine Gifts

J. J. (Jack) Lynch, manager of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical and Portland Retail Druggists' associations, has received word from the National Quinine Pool in Washington, D. C., that Oregon's drive for quinine for the armed forces in the tropics, made under the sponsorship of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical association, resulted in a total collection of 1,096,712 grains or about 2500 ounces. This amount is sufficient to supply 10,000 service men for more than three months with the normal immunizing dose of ten grains a day.

Senator Lynch stated that Oregon's record is something of which the state may well be proud since the collection average for all states was 2800 ounces. However, many of the states have populations running several times that of Oregon. Therefore, on a per capita basis Oregon's contribution to the National Quinine Pool, which is so essential to the health and well-being of the boys in the service, leads the nation. Oregon's quinine donations average 4.7 ounces per drug store.

The initial drive, which netted 337,017 grains, was confined largely to the retail drug store industry, many of whom contributed their entire quinine stocks having a value of more than \$50 each. The service stores which have just been completed, produced 698,695 grains, a considerable portion of which was donated by the public in response to a special appeal.

These donations were made by the Oregon State Police, headed by Charles Pray, who covered every drug store outside Multnomah county, whereas collections in Multnomah county were made by the Red Cross War Corp headed by Miss Ruth Clark.

### County Barely Meets Half of Plasma Quota

Thousands of our fighting men can say, "I owe my life to blood plasma." Hundreds of these men have been snatched from almost certain death to return to action just because someone recognized that the inconvenience of a short time taken from a busy day was nothing compared to the sacrifice made by the men who are suffering on the field of battle. Blood plasma has an A-1 priority all the way from the donor center right up to the battle lines. Ten minutes after a man is wounded he can be given the blood plasma that will save his life. There is no delay for blood typing since plasma is universal. Plasma lasts indefinitely, can be sent anywhere and can be prepared for use in a matter of moments.

Plasma and the sulfa drugs are recognized by army men as the most important factors revolutionizing wartime surgery. Approximately 1,300,000 pints of blood were donated by patriotic American people in 1942 and the army and navy has asked for at least 4,000,000 pints more by the end of 1943.

Washington county residents are offered an opportunity to aid in the life-saving plasma program that is not available to everyone in this country. Only 33 fixed blood donor centers are located in the United States; their location being determined by proximity to laboratories equipped to extract plasma from the blood. Portland is one of these centers, giving people in this area the opportunity to donate and providing an obligation to meet the quotas. The process of making a blood donation is further simplified in Washington county by the fact that a mobile unit visits Hillsboro twice each month, eliminating the
