Flight Instructors Play Vital Part in Army Air Success

Part of the glory being won by American army fliers on the fighting fronts of the world belongs to the unsung heroes of the Army Air Forces—the flight instructors who start aviation cadets on the difficult journey of becoming officers, fighter pilots, bomber pilots and other designations in the army. This explanation of the role of the little-known army flight instructors was given in a recent letter from Edward J. Ball, former Cornelius pilot who operated a flying school at the Hillsboro airport before the war and who is now flight commander at Sequia field near Visalia in California.

"While all instructors in the primary schools remain civilians, they hold designations in the army reserve and are subject to call into active duty at any time," Ball wrote. "Some of the instructors do receive commissions and are sent into active duty in some other branch of the air forces such as ferry pilots and transport command."

The army does have instructors who are commissioned officers in the basic and advanced schools but they do not teach anyone to fly. The basic and advanced instructors teach the cadet cockpit procedure, blind and instrument flying, and formation flying and check him out in strange and larger airplanes that he has never flown before. It is from the commissioned army instructor that the cadet learns to fly in combat.

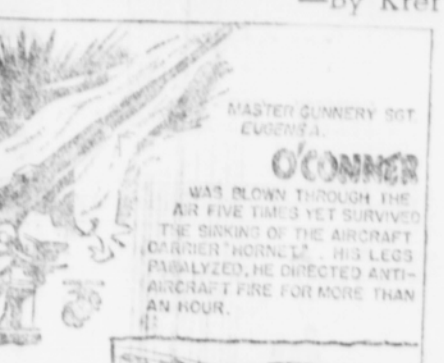
Following excerpts from a news article further outlining the role of flight instructors were sent by Ball:

"General Cousins recently paid tribute to the flight instructors, praising them as 'the unsung heroes of the Army Air Forces.' While they hold designations in the army reserve, the army looks upon them as too important to send on combat missions. They are employed as the flight instructors at all of the Army Air Forces primary training schools."

All of the heroes of the Army Air Forces, now blasting the axis on widespread battle fronts, started their careers of pilots riding in a training plane with one of the instructors.

Many of the instructors were civil flying school operators before the outbreak of the war. Others were civilian fliers with only a few hours flying time to their credit. The "veterans" took refresher courses, learned to fly the way the army ordered and the youngsters brushed up on their flying under tutelage of army pilots. They became the mainstay of the air forces and when they carried out successful raids being tried out over enemy territory or a flight of the Army Air Forces downing a group of enemy planes, they realize that they have played no little part in the war.
