

Consolidation with Banks Union High School Considered at Meet Thursday

BANKS—A meeting was held Thursday evening at Banks union high school to discuss the possibility of consolidating a number of surrounding grade school districts with the Banks union high school district. A majority of the directors of the nine districts interested were present and also County School Superintendent Austin Scaffaro, and a few other interested persons. The nine school districts that are being invited into the Banks union high school district are Mountaindale, Meacham, Mead, Green Mountain, Scofield, Strassell, Buxton, Roy, and Bacons. Pupils from these districts are now being transported to Banks. Consolidation would strengthen the district and would be furnished by the union high school district instead of the non-union high school. Consolidation would also add \$944,330.19 to the present valuation of \$1,133,334.48, making a total valuation of \$2,097,664.67 for the entire district.

The many advantages of consolidation were presented by Austin Scaffaro, and it was shown that there would be little gain or loss to any of the districts involved if the project carried. After some discussion it was decided by members of the school boards to put the matter up for a vote at a date which will be set later.
