Hillsboro has a city manager, it does not have a city manager form of government. He said that under the present charter the mayor may or may not appoint a city manager. The powers of the manager are also quite closely hedged under the present setup.

The new charter would provide for a true city manager form of government, where the manager is elected by the council, is responsible to the council and may be removed for or without cause, it was explained. The manager would have the appointment of subordinates so that he would be directly responsible for the efficient management of city affairs.

Patterson said Mayor Hugh Rogers for the vesting of powers in the city manager and also pointed out that the mayor has looked to the manager for recommendations.

The old ward system, under which councilmen have been elected by wards would be changed under the new charter so that members of the council would be elected from the city at large. The mayor or does not have veto power, but is given a vote on all questions and serves as the presiding officer of the council.
