## War Work Chief Campus Activity at Corvallis

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Student activities here this past term consisted largely of organized efforts toward helping win the war, according to a report just made by Associated Student officers summarizing the work of the college war council headed by Bill Gibson, Portland, Gibson also heads the Oregon Federation of College War Councils formed last fall to encourage such activity.

## Miss Pennington Heads Nurses' Assignment Group

The War Manpower commission's procurement and assignment service for physicians, dentists and veterinarians now includes nurses, according to Miss Corinne Pennington, head of the county health office.

On December 13 a meeting for all local chairmen was held at the Medical Dental building in conjunction with Miss Harriett Smith, field consultant, nursing division, War Manpower commission, Washington, D. C., in attendance to give instructions as to committee organization and procedure in Portland and vicinity.

Miss Corinne Pennington, senior nurse in the Washington county public health department, received her appointment as local chairman for the assignment of nurses in the county health office.

Members of the committee are: F. T. Burke, M. D., medical director, Washington county health department, in charge; Wilcox R. N., superintendent, Forest Grove General hospital, Forest Grove; Miss Grace Sahnow, R. N., director of nurses in charge, Hillsboro; Miss Blanche Fuller, R. N., retired hospital superintendent, Forest Grove; Mrs. R. Frank Peters, member of the committee, 7 Hillsboro; and E. J. McAlear, attorney-at-law, Hillsboro.

Objectives of the committee are to meet the needs of the armed forces, having due consideration for civilian nursing needs, and to bring about the equitable distribution of nurses in order to maintain the best possible nursing service for the civilian population and non military governmental agencies.

Quotas will be determined by the central office and distributed to the state offices with directions detailing the practice to be used in filling the quotas.

Since December, 1941, Washington county's survey of nurses has been kept up to date in the hope of being ready for emergency situations which might arise.

The work of this new committee will work to the advantage of both the nurses themselves and the clientele which they serve, be it government or civilian.
