

Women's Part Crop Saving Told AAUW

Importance of the dairy training course at Oregon State college was stressed by Mrs. Mabel C. Mack, assistant state supervisor of emergency farm labor service, in her talk to the American Association of University Women of Forest Grove and Hillsboro here last Saturday afternoon. "Recruitment of Women for Farm Labor" was Mrs. Mack's subject, and she urged women's organizations to help build a constructive view-point toward the employment situation, getting leaders in the crop harvests when the season approaches. Emphasis is being placed on the dairy training course now so that enough full-time dairy workers will be equipped for the peak load in March. Women interested may secure further details at the county agent's office.

In stepping up production last year, farmers felt that the bottlenecks would be labor shortage. Recruiting, training, supervision and placement was undertaken by the emergency farm labor service. On March 1 the women's division of the AAUW placed 22,000 women in 82,000 men and 67,000 boys and girls under 18 years of age. Only about 4200 of the youth workers were started. During the season expected that more supervisors will be available this year. About 2000 platoon leaders served last year, seven of these being in Washington county. Segregation of workers into definite age groups has been found to bring about the greatest efficiency, Mrs. Mack pointed out.

Red Cross Makes Large Shipment

Red Cross production room made large shipments to the army and navy last month, according to a report given by the committee in charge. The report follows: Sewing for the month of December, 345 1/2 hours were put in by workers in the production rooms. Five bolts, measuring 225 yards of War Relief material for blouses has been received. Have purchased 107 yards of twill to make 300 each of kit bags and 400 housewives, 373 yards of muslin to make bed shirts and 110 yards of material for pajamas and pneumonia jackets. 675 garments were completed and shipped during December.

During the year from January 1 to December 31, 1943, we have completed and shipped 4,710 sewed garments, 1330 kit bags (200 filled) 1130 housewives, 106 pillows, 382 wash cloths, 33 piece of afghans and 30 piece of tied comforters. Knitting for the month of December, 23 army helmets, 13 pair gloves, 39 knee bands, 44 V-neck sweaters.

During the year from January 1 to December 31, have completed and shipped 45 watch caps, 19 pair socks, 26 pair gloves, 4 scarves, 92 sweaters, 45 helmets. For the navy, 61 cap mufflers, 40 mufflers, 62 helmets, 96 pair gloves, 227 sweaters. For the army, 83 piece of afghans and 107 toe socks, 60 knee bands, 14 afghans (knitted and pieced), 125 knitted garments for war relief.
